Message From the Principal,

Suallkuchi is the centre of socio-cultural and economic activities among a cluster of villages under the revenue circle of Hajo in Kamrup District, Assam. At the same time, it is a large village sheltered by nearly 30,000 populations being divided into 4 Anchalik Panchayats. On the other hand it is connected to the other parts of the state by a single PWD road for communication depicting location-wise remoteness of the village. More than 25% of the inhabitants in the village do belong to SC community while the rest of the populace is caste Hindu including the OBC ones.

The Sualkuchi Budram Madhab Satradhikar College (SBMS College) at Sualkuchi was established on 1.8.1963 as a non Govt. public institution of higher education. Prior to this, there was no provision for higher education on the northern bank of river Brahmaputra in the district except Nalbari college as its nearest one which is 50 Km away from Sualkuchi. It was the outcome of the dreams of the villagers to have an institution of its kind, who contributed to their best to translate their dream into reality. Iswar Sri Sri Hati Satra, the Vaisnavite religious institution of the locality, volunteered to donate as many as 42 Bighas (181620 Sq. mts) of land in a single plot for the college. In honour of the spiritual leaders of the Satra, the college was named as Budram Madhab Satradhikar College, popularly known as S.B.M.S. College. Dr. T.C. Rastogi was the first Principal of the college.

The college is affiliated to Gauhati University. Temporary affiliation was accorded in 1966-67 (Vide Ec Resolution No. 10/179(B) dt. 13.9.66) with the subject English, Assamese, Alternative Assamese, History, Political Science, Economics and Education. Permanent affiliation was accorded w.e.f. 8.9.97 by the University for the subjects stated above to impart both General and Major Programmes. The college was brought under grant-in-aid (GIA) system w.e.f. 1.12.1972. At present the services of the teachers and employers of the college are brought under the provision of provincialisation by the Govt. of Assam. On the other hand the college brought under the regulation 2f in 28/7/1968 (vide U.G.C letter no. F-13-15/68(C-D) and 12(B) of U.G.C. in 14/4/1972.

In its second phase of expansion in 1989, Science Stream was introduced in the college. The authority had to wait for provincialisation of the Stream for long 25 years. Finally the stream was brought under Provincialisation w.e.f. 14.8.2013.

At present more than 1300 hundred students enrolled in the college. The strength of the teaching staff is 44. The central library of the college consists of nearly twenty four thousand books (24,000). Besides the professionally qualified librarian, three supporting staff are engaged for smooth functioning of the library.

It needs no mention that hundred percent of our students are from rural area. Quite a sizable number of them are the first generation learner in higher education. Poor economic conditions coupled with psycho-social constraints are the major challenge before us in leading them towards development of wholesome personality. Yet our endeavour in this regard is relentless and this institution will march ahead with its vision and mission to serve the Nation by serving the rather unserved.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Situated on the North Bank of the river Brahmaputra, SBMS College is the only seat of higher education in a complete rural backdrop. This Institution is proud of illuminating the minds of the youths of the locality famous not only for its handlooms but also for its rich culture and heritage. The College was established by some of the Good Samaritans of yester-years who thought that life is incomplete their village without higher education. At present, the Institution is rich with more than 1300 pupils, all of whom are thirsty for knowledge.

SBMS College is rich enough with 42 bighas (181620 Sq. metres) of land and an ecofriendly atmosphere. There is one pond and a huge numbers of trees within the campus. Added to this are the faculty members are always ready to mould the minds of the next generations in the right way. The generosity of two noble saints- Budram and Madhab--both of whom are Satradhikars--amply exemplify the fact that, in spite of being located in a totally rural area, there are people whose thirst for knowledge can never be quenched.

Despite limitations of all sorts, SBMS College has always strived to hold up its head high. Our students, whom we have always treated as our wealth, have extended their cooperation in the teaching-learning process. Total transparency is what that has led them to have full faith in the Institution. Though we do not have many resources, we try to democratise all activities in the Institution. The Students' Union Election held every year is a good example to support this fact.

To familiarise the students with the overall mechanisms of the Institution, The College publishes a Prospectus every year at the beginning of the academic session. The Prospectus informs the students about the various functions of the Institution. For example, it lays out the class routine, the schedule for the examinations, the holiday list the fees structure and so on.

In the field of extension, SBMS College has always lent a helping hand to those who are in need. Recently the college staff has voluntarily donated to the relief of the flood affected victims of Boko. They have also donated blood to the needy and have participated in the "Campus Cleanliness Drive".

CRITERION-1

CURRICULAR ASPECTS:

A fixed and definite Syllabus and Curriculum are followed by SBMS College. However innovations have always been made to make the young learners reach their goals and missions. It offers 10+2 courses in both the Arts and the Science Streams. English, Alternative English, Assamese, Elective Assamese, Economics, Education, Political Science, History, Logic & Philosophy, Botany, Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics, Zoology are the subjects that the College have been teaching till now. The Institution has programmes in Diploma Courses in Computer Science and Communicative English. But our expectations are high and we still have "miles and miles to go".

The Institution ensures that the objectives of the Curriculum are achieved in due course of its implementation. The students' feedback mechanism keeps the authority, and the teaching faculty well acquainted with the achievements and drawbacks related to the functioning and application of the Curriculum. Meetings are held quite frequently with the guardians. The Institution offers 7 undergraduate level courses in the Arts Stream, 5 in the Science Stream, 1 Self-financed Undergraduate Course in Computer Application and another Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Application. The College has devised strategically certain combination of subjects under the newly introduced Semester System for the benefit of the students' future studies.

CRITERION-2

TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION:

The College follows a transparent admission process. The details of the admission process with fee structure are published through the College Prospectus, in the admission forms and in the notice boards. There is no system of cut-off marks for the students of general courses. However, in major courses the cut off marks is not below 45%. The College follows the norms of reservation of seats for the students belonging to SC, ST and OBC.

Students are allowed to choose their own combination of subjects. There is a counselling session for the new comers to introduce them with their courses and their contents.

There are provisions for remedial classes, tutorial classes, and internal assessment tests for the students to improve the teaching-learning process. The interactive method, project works, field studies, study tours, and ICT enabled class room facilities are provided by the College to improve the academic atmosphere for the students.

Publication of departmental wall magazines, college annual magazine, etc. has resulted in a marked increase in the creativity of the students in recent years. The organisation of different events such as seminars, popular talks, different literary competitions, etc. is some of the efforts of the College to encourage the students. Audio visual aids, internet facilities and smart classes have also encouraged the students to carry out their project works and other assignments. The College Central Library and the various departmental libraries have adequate number of text and reference books.

With a dedicated teaching staff including a competent Principal, the College is trying to fulfill the dreams and aspirations of the local people of the greater Sualkuchi area as it is the only higher educational institution of the locality.

CRITERION-3

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES:

With a land area of 42 bighas (181620 sq. mts.), SBMS College is quite rich in its infrastructural side. The college has a huge number of trees, one pond, a gymnasium, a canteen, a girls' hostel, a cycle stand, a language laboratory and a dark room (for Physics Department). Our learning resources include more than twenty-three thousand books in a spacious library (2400 sq. fts.), a reading room and an internet zone with six computers.

In the field of learning, our learners are enthusiastic enough. They are born in a totally rural area and are deprived of their basic education from their childhood. As such, they approach us with interest and a thirst for knowledge and we too feel their deprivation and try to quench their thirst.

The process of the evaluation of our Institution is totally transparent. We conduct Sessional and Unit Tests and we supply the answer-sheets to every student for self-evaluation at the time of the declaration of their results.

CRITERION-4

RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION:

In spite of the want of transport and communication, our College is rich with ten Ph.D holders and fourteen M.Phil holders that have come from the different districts of Assam to lend their support in the process of enlightening the minds of the young learners of the village.

The Institution has a Career Guidance and Counseling Cell which has proved to be a great help to our pupils for their life ahead as bread-earners. Many students from our College have been able to establish themselves quite satisfactorily in many government and private sector offices.

The College authority provides all the necessary arrangements for the smooth progress of the research projects. The arrangements provided by the authority includes the release of funds to the particular investigator, guiding the investigators to complete the projects within the stipulated time, inspiration and moral support to the researchers to publish their findings in journals, books, etc.

The College has been organising different workshops, training programmes, and sensitization programmes on different vital issues at regular intervals. Such ventures have been immensely helpful not only in generating research problems but also in identifying research questions. Moreover the faculty members are as well benefitted by such programmes in finding new themes and ideas for their research.

The faculty members are inspired by the College authority to present their research findings in different Conferences and Seminars specifically by granting leave to them. Moreover, the Principal of the College constantly inspires the faculty to publish the findings of the individual research works in journals, magazines, etc. The process of the publication

of a research journal from the College is going on to intensify the venture of research publications.

CRITERION-5

STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION:

SBMS College has always been eager to support and promote its pupils in their future life. The authority of the Institution has kept a close eye on the welfare of the students through its library, computer laboratory, language laboratory, smart classrooms, placement cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, College Study Circle, and Women's Cell.

There are student support systems such as government scholarships, scholarship for students belonging to the minority communities, welfare-fund, etc., in the Institution. Most of the students of this Institution not only belong to the economically weaker sections of the society but also to the SC, OBC and the minorities for which the Institution is always ready to provide financial assistance to them. Scholarship forms are issued to eligible students on time and thereafter timely submission of forms and disbursement of scholarships are also ensured.

Medical assistance and health care facilities are made available to students through free medical-camps organised by the N.C.C., the N.S.S. & the Women-Cell of the Institution. Moreover, the Institution has a tie-up with the local P.H.C. from where qualified doctors attend to the students.

There is a facility of providing books to the poor but meritorious students from the Students' Welfare Fund of the College. The annual magazine of the College, Arunav, is published under the guidance of the authority and the teachers. Through the magazine, creative writing is encouraged. Departmental magazines are published from time to time. The wall-magazine, Anubhuti, is published on a half-yearly basis.

The Institution always encourages its students to participate in various extracurricular activities through the College Week Festival, Freshmens' Social, Youth Festival, Quiz, Inter-College Debate Competition, and Inter-College Sports and Cultural Activities. Interested students in games and sports are also identified and given the opportunity to represent in various institutions of higher education in different levels of competitions. Finance is never a constraint in sending those students to such competitions.

Additional academic support is provided by granting students reading materials, books through access to the departmental libraries, over and above the College central library, by introducing the smart board classrooms, providing computer know- how through formal classes and undertaking of remedial and tutorial classes and additional classes by the teaching faculty.

The Institution organizes various programs such as parents-teachers meet, home visits to academically weaker students, besides providing special Remedial and Tutorial Classes to give special support to students who are at risk of failure and being drop-outs.

CRITERION-6

GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

SBMS College being a provincialised college as per the 'Provincialised Act 2005', Government of Assam, is to be governed by defined Government rules. The College is affiliated to Gauhati University, Assam. So in academic matters our Institution follows the Gauhati University norms. The institutional authority ensures the management as per the norms with utmost transparency. In addition to existing statutory bodies, various committees and sub-committees are formed to achieve meaningful decentralizing and participating character which is in other way the factor to strengthen the feeling of attachment to the College. Along with this it is also very much effective in grooming leadership qualities among all the members of the College family.

A Governing Body duly constituted as per Government rules and regulations runs the College. Generally, this Body empowers the Principal and Secretary of the College to constitute bodies various committees and sub-committees. A Convener heads each committee. The Principal nominates teacher in charges to monitor and supervise the activities of the Students' Union Election of the Institution. Temporary staff is also engaged both for academic and official purposes in the time of need. To maintain transparency and the best management of the College activities, an Annual Report is published each year.

CRITERION-7

INOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

Although handicapped by its completely rural backdrop and its remote locality, SBMS College has repeatedly strived to overcome all difficulties and has been able to pass fifty long years of its existence. The motto of the College is—"Na Hi Gnanena Sadrisham Pabitramiha Bidyate" SBMS College believes in the spirit of creativity and achievement of a steady change in the academic ambience.

Environmental consciousness is enshrined in the main objective of the Institution and plantation of trees is the major concern carried out by the authority to maintain an ecofriendly atmosphere inside the campus.

The Institution always tries to motivate students by organising different activities so that they can become responsible to the society. Every year the NSS, the NCC and the Social Service wings of the College organise collaborative programmes with the students and the local people. The seminar on environmental issues, popular talks on HIV/AIDS, blood donation camp, community work with a village adoption camp, etc. brought the students and the local people in one platform. This encouraged the students to make a close relationship with the society as a whole.

With the aim of creating a disciplined academic environment in the Institution, the College is trying its level best under the umbrella of its authority. Among the various drives undertaken for this purpose, the introduction of a system of keeping Academic Audit is a unique one.

The Institution maintains a Students' Welfare Fund. The basic objective of this Fund is to help and motivate the economically poor but meritorious students to receive education.

The Institution, being the only Institution of higher education of the locality, feels the responsibility of educating the poor students within its limitations.

- With the inception in the year 1963, Sualkuchi Budram Madhab Satradhikar College, the sole co-educational NAAC accredited premier institution of higher education in Sualkuchi, the silk town of Assam, serves to provide a platform for the needs and demands of the students belonging to an exclusively rural area. The name of the institution bears the haloed memory of two great Satradhikars, Late Budram Mahanta and Late Madhab Mahanta of Sri Sri Hati Satra, dedicated to spread the religious cult of Vaisnavism founded by Mahapurush Srimanta Sankardeva, the pioneer of Neo-Vaisnavite movement in Assam. The Satra had initiated an innovation by donating 42bighas (12.65 Acre) of land to the institution in order to inculcate, disseminate and promote higher education among the rural youths. The establishment of the college in the year 1963 was a dream come true for the entire populace of the area who had so long been deprived of higher education as it was the first seat of higher education in the entire locality. It is also believed to be the first institution of higher learning located in the village panchayat area in the state.

Our Vision

As the only seat of higher education of the locality, this institution aims to impart quality education to learners and to enable them to meet the needs and challenges of the time. It also envisages in erecting a proper platform for the learners to mould high degree of intellectuality, spirituality and social allegiance for building a sound and healthy social order and discipline within the plurality and diversity of religion and culture of the nation.

The vision of the college is communicated to the students through an inaugural address delivered by the Principal on the day of admission every year.

The objective of the college is communicated to students through guidance and counseling by various departments during the time of the admission process.

Guidance is also provided by the teaching faculty at the onset of every session, through direct interaction with the students.

Through seminars, workshops, camps, sports and physical education (social, academic, and cultural activities), the vision, mission and objective of the institution are highlighted.

These activities in essence, groom the students to shoulder their social responsibilities.

1.1.2. How does the Institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The curriculum is implemented through a well formulated action plan as outlined in the Prospectus. In the beginning of every academic session, through its Prospectus, the college provides the students an Annual Academic Calendar prepared by the affiliating University for the effective implementation of the Curriculum. The Academic Calendar specifies the entire schedule including classes, working days, holidays, examination and various academic and cultural activities. There are some faculty members of the institution who represent the curriculum designing & developing committee of the affiliating University, who at times, extend their views regarding the curriculum design and implementation meant for the undergraduate level.

In the beginning of every academic session the Head of each department allocates the course-contents to each faculty at the departmental level. Each department then prepares the teaching -plan, lesson-plan and Academic-Audit Reports for the whole academic session. The duly filled up 'Students Feed-Back' forms also maintain the progress report of each individual teacher and the course so as to review the implementation of the curriculum and for improved future plans and actions. The 'Students Feed-Back' mechanism tries to analyse and assess all deliberations, particularly those pertaining to the class-curriculum and syllabus coverage.

Regular 'Parent-Teacher Meet' gives guardians an opportunity to interact with the teaching faculty. The Academic Peer Team of the affiliating university occasionally visits our college, as resource persons for workshops and seminars or for inspections, and college avails of the opportunity of benefitting itself by taking their valuable suggestions on the effective implementation of the curriculum. In this context, we are proud to say that we have been given invaluable suggestions and proposals by many famed intellectuals, some of whom are Prof. Krishna Gopal Bhattacharya (Ex- Director, Academic Staff College, G.U.) Prof. Jogen Kalita (Inspector, College Development Council) and Prof. Jyoti Tamuly (Coordinator, IQAC, G.U).

Workshops and seminars are attended by the teachers so as to keep themselves abreast with various fields of study. Workshops on Curriculum Development have been attended by teachers at the University level. Class-room deliberations are made through the smart board, multi-media and audio-visual aids, as far as feasible. Physical education, sports, yoga-classes and camps, eco-camps, environmental field-trips and work-out at the gymnasium are an integral part of the curriculum. To supplement the conventional course, the P.G.D.C.A, B.C.A and D.C.A run on parallel grounds. The institution has in the meantime made operational a Language Laboratory in order to cater to the various language based needs of the students. Since computer know- how is essential now-a-days for everyone, the institution introduced a mandatory one year diploma course (DCA) at the Higher Secondary level.

1.1.3. What type of support (procedural &practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and / or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

- The teaching faculty is supported through procedural as well as practical measures for enriching their teaching practices and effectively translating the curriculum. Our newly appointed faculty members are granted leaves for participating in Orientation Course. Likewise leave grant is also arranged for the senior ones to participate in Refresher Course and Short-Term Courses. Many of the classes are delivered through multi-media, the smart-board and the audio-visual aids. The College Library substantiates the requirement for additional reading materials in the form of reference books, magazines on current affairs, national and international journals, over and above providing internet facility for supportive information. Intermittently, career-oriented programmes and quality enhancement programmes are extended by the S.I.R.D, I.I.E, I.A.S.S.T, Assam Science Society and others. These programmes are in addition to those courses provided by the University for Teachers to enhance their career opportunities as well as teaching acumen. Moreover, the teaching faculties have brought home their experiences through their participation in international seminars and workshops.
- 1.1.4. Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating university or other statutory agency.

The classes are uniformly distributed through the College Routine. Against the conventional classes of 45 minutes duration, the institution has made a new venture by extending the duration of first two classes by 15 minutes.

At the onset of every Semester, meetings are held at all departmental level and the syllabus is distributed among the teachers. Student feedback is encouraged to enable students to ventilate their opinions. Sessional examinations keep the students attuned to their course and accordingly assessment is made. General meetings are held to discuss in details all aspects of the curriculum. Multi- media and the smart- board make classes more innovative and interactive. At the time of admission, the authority addresses the students and the new incumbents to make them familiar with the norms of the Semester Course. Every department provides an introduction to the subject -combinations as enumerated in the College Prospectus and extend their valuable suggestions. The teaching faculty continuously up-date themselves on the subject-matter pertaining to their own fields through participation in Orientation Course, Refresher Course and Short Term Courses and on multi-disciplinary ones, according to the schedule of the affiliating University. Moreover, they participate in workshops on Curriculum Development.

1.1.5. How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in the effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

Sualkuchi is a renowned place for its handloom products of Silk and Muga (Mulberry Silk). It is backbone of the economy of the villagers and has given a unique identity to the village in the state of Assam. Parallel to this, the trade and commerce related to these products, to a great extent, is managed by registered co-operatives. There are as many as thirteen (13) registered co-operatives in the village.

Various teaching departments of the college do maintain a good relationship with these co-operatives and production units so as to give our students a first-hand experience of production and management relating to this weaving industry. The institution conducts frequent tours to the local handlooms to study their functioning. It thereby enhances the future prospects of the students who are willing to engage themselves in those small- scale

industries. The Department of Economics visited the local industrial estate situated at Bonda, Noonmati, under the "Udyug Jyoti"- to provide a firsthand and practical knowledge to the students about the various aspects of industries.

A week-long intensive training was also provided to 30 students of the college in SIFT (Sualkuchi Institute of Fashion Technology) about the process of Natural Dyeing.

A few teachers participated a ten day training programme in Indian Institute of Entrepreneurship, Lalmati, Guwahati, on "The General Prospects of Self-Employment".

- 1.1.6. What are the contributions of the institution and/ or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the university?(Number of staff members/ departments represented on the board of studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholders' feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.
 - The institution is proud to have some of its staff members, who, along with the authority of the college, offer the valuable suggestions towards the development of the curriculum. It is worthwhile to mention that, the Principal, Dr. Dipesh Ch. At present, Mr. Rituparna Das (Dept. of Assamese) is also a representative member discharging his duties in the same process.

A few members of the teaching faculty have also contributed to the process of the development and bringing about innovations in the curriculum by putting forward their suggestions in different Seminars and Workshops.

Moreover, the institution has recently devised a separate curriculum for soft-skill development (Communicative English) for students at the Undergraduate level. This project is on the verge of being implemented with the aim of enhancing market oriented skill for job & self-employment.

1.1.8. How does the institution analyze/ ensure that the objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The institution analyses and ensures that the objectives of the curriculum are achieved in the course of its implementation. The student feedback mechanism keeps the authority, and the teaching faculty well acquainted with the achievements and drawbacks attached to the functioning and application of the curriculum. Meetings are held intermittently with the guardians. The Alumni also provides a steady mechanism to enable the institution to track the achievements and accolades of the students who have graduated from the institution and thereafter have found placement in various jobs. Many have qualified for the NET and the SLET. The teaching faculty also undertakes coaching classes for the TET aspirants. The N.C.C and the N.S.S. conducts camps, seminars and symposiums to familiarise the students with various issues relating to academics, environment, global topics, defence and allied services, new trends in self-employment schemes and others.

1.2. Academic Flexibility:

1.2.1. Specify the goals and objectives giving details of the certificate/ diploma/ skill development courses offered by the institution

Through the Certificate / Diploma/ Skill-Development Courses, the institution aims at entrepreneurship development, employability, development of self-confidence and positive attitude in students. The courses provided by the IDOL, K.K. Handiqui State Open University, P.G.D.C.A, D.C.A and B.C.A aims at achieving and channelizing their skill in particular or specific fields of specialization and study.

The college has introduced a Self-Financed Course in 'Bachelor of Computer Application' (BCA) and 'Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Application' (PGDCA) as full time course under Gauhati University. The details are as follows:

Bachelor of Computer Application:

Further opportunity for study: Students can study MCA, MSc-IT, MSc (Computer

Science), and MBA under any University after completing BCA.

Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Application (PGDCA):

Eligibility: Graduate from any discipline.

Duration : One year (Two Semesters)

Examination: Examinations are conducted by the Gauhati University on the basis of

Semester System.

Further opportunity for study: Student can study MCA under any University after

completing PGDCA. At present there are two University Contact Centers functioning in

the college campus. They are as follows:

A) IDOL CONTACT CENTRE:

A contact centre under IDOL (Institute of Distance & Open Learning) of Gauhati

University is there in the college campus which offers M.A. in the subjects: Assamese,

English, Economics, History, Political Science and Philosophy. A Post Graduate Diploma

Course in Computer Application (PGDCA) programme under the IDOL is also offered

with the full facilities of computer laboratory and qualified faculty members.

B) K.K. HANDIQUI STATE OPEN UNIVERSITY STUDY CENTRE:

From 2008-09, a contact centre of K.K. Handiqui State Open University also started functioning in the college campus. The main purpose of this centre is to promote education to reach the unreached through the open and distance learning system. The courses of this University are open for working people, house-wives, and drop-out students and for any persons, who want to pursue higher studies.

The study centre of the college however, only offers the following courses to students at present:

- 1. Bachelor Preparatory Programme(BPP)
- 2. Bachelor of Arts (BA)
- 3. Master of Arts (MA in Assamese, Economics, Education & Political Science).

1.2.2. Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate / twining / dual degree? If 'yes', give details.

- Although the institution does not have the technical prerogative of awarding dual degree, yet it facilitates programmes such as, awarding bachelors as well as post graduate degrees through Institute of Distance and Open Learning (IDOL) and Krishna Kanta Handiqui State Open University (KKHSOU). The institution also has a self-financed Degree Course in Bachelor of Computer Application (BCA) and PGDCA.
- 1.2.3. Give details on the various institution provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability.
 - In the field of academic flexibility, the institution offers 7 Undergraduate level courses in the Arts Stream, 5 in the Science Stream, 1 Self-financed Undergraduate Course in Computer Application and another Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Application. Besides, the institution provides further academic flexibility especially for the weaker students by allowing them to study T.D.C General Course (i.e. without major subject) in both the streams. Keeping in mind the development of the skills, the academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability, the college has

devised strategically certain combination of subjects under the newly introduced Semester System which are indicated below in Table 1.8for Arts Stream and Table 1.9 for Science Stream.

- 1.2.5. Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and beneficiaries.
- Yes, the college provides skill oriented programmes which are relevant to regional and global employment markets. The institution has a one year diploma course for higher secondary students in Computer Application and a four week crash course on Communicative English for both higher secondary and under graduate students. Moreover, the college has organised a week long training programme for 27 students under the aegis of Sualkuchi Institute of Fashion Technology (SIFT) on "Natural Dyeing", which has a great relevance to the local handloom industry of Sualkuchi.
- 1.2.6. Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face to face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose their courses/combination of their choice? If 'yes' how does the institution take advantage of such position for the benefit of students.
- The University provides for the flexibility of combining the conventional face to face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose their courses/ combination of their choice through Institute of Open and Distance Learning (IDOL). S.B.M.S. College too has a centre of this Distance Mode of Education. Many students, alumni of the college and from outside deprived of post graduation due to family compulsion or professional constraints are encouraged to pursue their post graduate studies under IDOL.

1.3. Curriculum Enrichment:

- 1.3.1. Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the university's curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and institution's goals and objectives integrated?
- S.B.M.S. College has continuously endeavored to disseminate knowledge among the students who mostly come from the lower middle class. The college, affiliated to the G.U, has given utmost priority to ensure that the pupils are provided with a routine that would help them in obtaining credits which are much essential in their over-all results. The G.U

has devised the required amount of classes to be devoted for each unit of the syllabus and the institution has meticulously tried to adhere to the credit –point system offered for each unit.

The institution takes pride in the fact that it offers both remedial and tutorial classes to the slow learners. Besides this the institution also provides necessary guidance to the meritorious students through tutorials.

A well-planned teaching plan is devised in order to ensure that the necessary units are covered well ahead of the sessional examinations for every semester. Academic Audits of the teachers and student progress reports are maintained by the institution to keep a steady record of their performances. A self-appraisal of the teachers is also regularly done through the audits maintained by each department.

Seminars, lectures by distinguished academicians and workshops are organized from time to time to enhance the knowledge of students. Special yoga camps, religious practices through observing various traditional rituals are held to imbibe sense of spirituality among the students.

The institution aims at improving the quality of learners and imparting higher education to the eligible youths of all categories (General/SC/ST/OBC) and preparing the students to understand and to cater to the social needs of the state and the locality in particular and to work in unison for the preservation and dissemination of arts and culture. As such the academic programmes of the institution are designed in such a way that the institutional goals and objectives are integrated.

1.3.2. What are the efforts made by the Institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to the needs of the dynamic employment market?

For the enhancement and enrichment of the curriculum provided by the University, the Institution organizes workshops, seminars and symposium from time to time.

Departmental projects related to the semester based system are selected in such a way so as to prepare the students to the needs of dynamic employment market.

As the institution is located in the heart of the silk handloom industry, most of the seminars and workshops organized by the college chose topics that help the students to cope up with the present dynamic employment market scenario.

Industrial visits and training programmes are held quite frequently to help the learners to become self-reliant and self-sufficient and also to become responsible citizens of the country.

A transparent feed-back system is maintained every year to ventilate the interests and aspirations of the students.

1.3.3. Enumerate the efforts made by the Institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc. into the curriculum?

The college authority undertakes different activities to integrate the cross-cutting issues such as Gender Issues, Environmental Education, Human Rights and ICT.

The institution, being a co-educational one, keeps the provision of equal representation of students of both the sexes at the time of admission every year.

There is a Women Cell in the college which, under the umbrella of the college authority, undertakes various programmes to bring Gender Sensitization among the students and the local community. The Cell observes International Women's Day every year by holding various programmes related to gender issues. This Women Cell has committed itself to take part in various activities such as, enlightening the Weavers of Sualkuchi, organizing health awareness camps to create consciousness amongst the women-folk of greater Sualkuchi and so on. It has organised a seminar on "Mother and Child Care", a workshop on "Participation of Women and their Role in Village Panchayat" and a talk on "Tradition, Modernity and Women in the Indian Context". The Women Cell was fortunate enough to organize a U.G.C sponsored National Seminar on

the theme "Phenomenon of Witch Hunting in the North-East: A Major Challenge to Women". Recently on the eve of International Women's Day, 2014, a lecture on "Breast Cancer and Cervical Cancer in Women" was organized by the Cell in order to arouse awareness amongst the students and the women–folk of the locality.

As per the University guidelines, Environmental study is a compulsory subject in the curriculum. The Institution has made it mandatory for every student to participate in programmes of Field Study in both the Higher Secondary and Undergraduate Classes on different Environmental issues. The students with their compulsory Project Reports of field study are thus made aware of the day –to- day environmental problems and their solutions.

The N.S.S and the N.C.C wings of the institution observe International Environment Day every year and have planted a number of trees both inside and outside the College campus. The other activities performed by the N.S.S and the N.C.C include cleanliness drive, community village adoption camp programme and organization of essay and art competitions among students in order to create an awareness on environmental issues.

The Department of Political Science organized a seminar on "Human Rights Violation" in order to bring awareness among the students about their rights. A number of faculty members from the Economics, History and Political Science departments delivered lectures on topics like "Women and Human Rights", "Domestic Violence and Human Rights" and "Role of Judiciary in Protection of Human Rights". Quite a number of people from the local community also participated in the seminar and exchanged their views and suggestions in the same.

The Department of Computer Science of the institution is entrusted to take the responsibility of providing first- hand knowledge of ICT to the students of the institution. There is a compulsory Diploma in Computer Application for the higher secondary students. The Undergraduate students are also provided with an opportunity of taking Computer Science as either their core or subsidiary subject. Internet facilities, a well-furnished computer laboratory, a language laboratory, LCD projectors, Smart-board class-rooms and the utilization of computers in the library, the administrative block and

in the different departments are a few of the facilities available in the college in the field of ICT.

1.3.5. Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feed-back from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum.

The institution organizes 'Guardian- Meet' twice annually to collect their valuable suggestions of the guardians as well as their general feed-back. In these meetings the stakeholders express their direct views about the curriculum and its merits or demerits, if

there are any. Thereafter the college authority forwards them to the Gauhati University to which the college is affiliated and thereby attempts to make amends for whatever shortcomings there are in the curriculum. It may be pointed out here that two of the faculty members are actively involved in the designing of the curriculum. Moreover, inputs are also sent to university pointing out the limitations of evaluation system.

1.3.6. How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The institution has an Academic Committee under the chairmanship of the Principal. The committee regularly monitors and evaluates the quality of its various enrichment programmes. There is a feedback mechanism in the institution. The institution takes feedback from the students, guardians, alumni and other stake holders on course curriculum and on other academic activities as a whole. Every year each department takes feedback from the students on course curriculum and sends the message to the authority for further improvements or for necessary steps to be taken. Students are given full freedom to share their views about their course curriculum.

There is a provision for verbal discussions in the class room between the teachers and the students where both the parties can share their views on course curriculum which are then communicated to the Syllabus Development committee of the parent University.

There is a demand for vocational courses. The students the alumni and the stake holders gave their suggestion for introducing vocational courses in the institution. Based on these suggestions the institution introduced the vocational courses on computer science, such as BCA, PGDCA, DCA and Spoken English Course. The authority also submitted a proposal to the state government for the courses like Information Technology. A proposal has-been sent to the UGC to introduce the scheme of Community College in the Institution.

1.4. Feedback System

1.4.1. What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the university?

So far as the designing of the curriculum is concerned, the Institution has some representatives to extend their valuable suggestions by participating in different workshops from time to time. In fact, the Principal of the College, Dr. D.C. Bhagabati, is the member of CCS (Committee of Courses of Studies) for U.G. Programme in Gauhati University.

As per the instruction of the G.U., the college holds sessional examinations for Undergraduate courses from time to time and accordingly sends reports of the evaluation process to G.U. Since the institution is affiliated to G.U., yet it does not enjoy the autonomy of designing the syllabus. However, certain add-on activities are at times implemented to suit the requirement of the students.

1.4.2. Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum? If 'yes' how is it communicated to University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/ new programmes?

Yes, the Institution has a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and other stakeholders as far as the curriculum are concerned.

The Institution distributes questionnaires to the students to enable them to ventilate their views and ideas about the curriculum. This is done at all departmental levels. Once it is done, it is dispatched to the authority, who, along with one of the members of the teaching faculty, who being a part of the Curriculum designing and development committee; communicate at the deliberations of the said committee.

Keeping in view the interests of the students and other stakeholders the Institution caters to the demand of the job market in the form of D.C.A, P.G.D.C.A, and Spoken English Courses. Besides, the institution provides a platform for Extension Education simultaneously with the conventional courses.

Academic meeting with the stakeholder promote direct interaction with the authority as well as the teaching faculty to enable them to act on the suggestions provided and implement them so far as feasible. Moreover, the Career Guidance and Counseling Cell further provide information regarding various avenues open at the job- market and enable

them to choose their vocation. The Women Cell of the college under the umbrella of the authority tries to bring forth, social and gender based issues through seminars and public awareness programmes.

1.4.3. How many new programmes/ courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rational for introducing new courses / programmes?

The college has introduced a self-financed course in Bachelor of Computer Application and Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Application (PGDCA) as full time courses under Gauhati University. Moreover the college has recently introduced a short-term course on Spoken English for the students of the college so that they get interested to learn English for functional and communicative purposes. Keeping in view to accommodate our students in the day- to –day cyber world and to make them enable to be up-to-date for job market and self-employment in the form of establishment. The following table indicates the rationale of the new programmes introduced by the college.

TEACHING- LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment & Profile:

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Notice inviting application for admission into the courses available is usually issued in the first part of May every year. Application forms along with the prospectus of the college are made available to aspiring students by Office of the Principal of the College. Notice in this regard is served in the College Notice Boards and different places of the locality. Printed flexes depicting the information are also placed on the centre places of the nearby villages and on Nalbari, Hajo- Guwahati Road, NH 37 at Amingaon point etc. Door-to-door notice is also served for the professional programmes through the newspapers distributors of the locality. Information to this effect is also made available through online mode in the college website.

Duly filled-in forms seeking admission to the programmes are scrutinized by the admission committee. The committee prepares the selection list in order of the merit and after giving due consideration to students belonging to the different reserved categories. Admission is offered to students as per the selection list of the candidates. Keeping in view the socio-economic status of the applicant and interest of the Govt. of Assam, we are exercising best effort to accommodate all the aspirants so far.

- 2.1.2 Explain in details the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by the state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test interview (iv) (any other) to various program of the Institution.
- Admission Committee prepares the merit list on the basis of the achievement score of the students obtained in the last qualifying public examination. Admission to UG program is

offered as per the merit list prepared. This of course not necessarily ensures that the concerned student will be offered all subjects to his/her expectation. Admission to Major programs is rather tough and it is strictly limited. A second line selection is done by the respective Departments and again on the basis of the merit of the students, admission to Major programme is recommended by the HoDs.

On the basis of recommendation of the HoDs, the Principal finally approves the admission to Major programme. Adequate weightage is given to students belonging to reserved categories.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry for each of the programme offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

Maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level varies from year to year. This limit is not fixed by the college. All students, declared to have passed XII standard public examination conducted by any recognized authority, are eligible for admission to UG/Vocational programs. Generally we try to accommodate up to 300 students in Arts and

120 in Science stream. Being an institution located in an exclusively rural area and dwelt by sizable number of lower middle-class families, we try to accommodate each and every applicant with a view to enhance the GER in higher education in this locality, and make higher education inclusive as much as possible. This spirit is obviously reflected in minimum score obtained by our students at the entry level qualifying test. The minimum and the maximum percentage of marks at entry admitted to this institution along with the same of the neighbouring institution are presented below.

- Student profile is regularly monitored after the close of the admission process every year. It gives us not only the gender distribution of students, but also to have a glance over their socio- economic status. Simultaneously, it leads us to perceive the order of preference for optional subjects among the students. Depending on such information,

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students:

2.2.1 How does the institution cater the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regards?

Physically challenged students are quite negligible in the institution. However, those few are given special attention at the time of examination allotting separate seating-arrangements if required. Communication to and from the college is also made available. Besides, in case of emergency, the institution seeks professional help from the local PHC. Special attention is given to the disabled students in the form of a ramp in the college.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If yes, give details on the process.

Yes, the institution is responsive and supportive as well to the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills. Ours is a two pronged strategy so as to ensure that students can proceed with right choice so far as selection of courses of study is concerned. The first step is exercised in the previous day of formal admission to the programme. An assembly of the students, guardians, teachers and Principal is held which is addressed by the Principal. Following this, students looking for Major in any of the subjects are addressed separately by group of teachers belonging to respective departments. This session of the counseling-programme is relatively more interactive in nature. Students of the respective departments are provided valuable and informative tips for a better preparation and a better achievement in their pursuits.

The second step of the strategy is exercised after the first work of regular teaching in classes is over. Capitalising the experience gathered after attending the classes during the first week if any student wants interchange in subjects of studies from major to subsidiary or vice-versa, the authority tries to comply with their request which is subject to the availability of seats in the sought subjects. This kind of practice is more student-friendly in respect of exercising the choice for courses of study on the basis of their knowledge and skills.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to the bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses etc.)

Remedial courses are conducted by the departments to bridge the knowledge gap especially for slow learners. Departmental seminars for enrichment of knowledge on challenging issues are also conducted from time to time. The institution received UGC grants to conduct remedial classes under XI plan period. Details are as follows:

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issue such as gender, inclusion, environment, etc.?

➤ Gender: SBMS College is a co-educational institution with nearly 60% in its enrolment being female students. Among the faculty too, more than 33% are female teachers. In the library, gender distribution is equal. Thus the institution itself presents positive signal for gender- friendly environment. No discrimination is allowed in respect of gender issues in the campus. Equal opportunity is accorded to girl students to contest for election to the Students Union, to participate in co-curricular activities, to enroll themselves in the NCC and offer

membership to NSS, etc. That there is a healthy atmosphere of equal privileges to members of both the sexes can easily be observed from the following points:

- **Students' Union Election,** which gives equal opportunity to the girl students to contest in different portfolios.
- Curricular and Co-Curricular activities inside and outside the college campus
 also provide equal opportunity to the girl students to participate in them.
 Moreover, celebrations of Girl-Child Week and International Women's Day are
 organized every year to infuse the spirit of gender equality to be followed in
 principle and practice.
- The **Women Cell**, an organization of the female teachers and employees of the College, is rendering yeomen's service in respect of the issue in question.
- The Grievance Redressal Cell (GR Cell) of the college plays a positive role in sensitizing the staff and students in favour of a positive gender-friendly attitude. Complaint or issues centering on gender are dealt with a firm hand to propagate the message of upholding a healthy attitude among all concerned in this regard.

Inclusion: As a public institution, the institution is dedicated to serve all sections of populace irrespective of caste and creed and is open to socio-economically weaker sections and to the differently abled ones. Our commitment to serve the society on the principle of equality and equitability is exercised in terms of offering seats to the students of weaker section as much as available, often even above the prescribed percentage of reservation of seats. To cater to the convenience of the differently abled students, certain renovations of infrastructure have been done.

Environment: The environment nurtured in the college campus reveals our love for nature. The campus is embellished with open fields, fishery, gardens and a luxuriant cluster of trees. The verdant environment of the campus conveys the universal message that we need to be nurtured by nature and nature is to be nurtured by us. Maintenance of cleanliness in the classroom as well as the campus, plantation of trees, hygienic disposal of wastes are normal practices exercised in the campus which have been made possible by the cooperation of each and every member of the college family.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special education/learning needs of advanced learners?

Each department of the institution identifies the advanced learners through their performances on the following ways:

Achievement in the Sessional Tests, interaction with the teachers, etc., offer better chance to identify the advanced learners. On identification of such learners, they are advised to

- Go through original publications of the authors instead of consulting edited text books
- Prepare self-compiled notes
- Get their notes checked by teachers
- Take part in curricular activities
- Complete their home assignments in due time
- Contribute to the departmental wall magazine through their composition
- Contribute to the departmental magazine through their composition

2.2.6 How does the institution collect, analyse and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop-out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections, etc.)

We have our own mechanism of continuous academic audit which helps us to closely monitor the performance of each and every student in respect of their achievements. Students with high risk of drop-out are identified and are then encouraged to improve themselves. They are also advised to take part in remedial teaching program. Their attendances in classes are also monitored. Finally they are advised for go through more student-friendly texts and reference books.

However, the undeniable fact is that, the above stated approaches are exercised in subjects where enrollment is reasonable in size. In the case of core subjects like English, where a teacher has to face more than 150students in a class it is quite unmanageable to follow this practice. This is one of the problems in higher education in an institution like ours.

2.3 Teaching- Learning process:

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching-learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation, blue print, etc.)

Ours is an Under Graduate College affiliated to Gauhati University. The affiliating University centrally prepares the academic calendar depicting the teaching days, holidays, etc. Keeping in view the academic calendar prepared by Gauhati University, we too prepare our own academic calendar in conformity with that of GU and the holiday list prepared by the Government of Assam.

New academic session begins on 1st August every year and classes for the Odd semesters (i.e. Semester I, III and V) commence from that day. Semester End Examinations start from the second half of November and December. Classes for even Semesters (i.e. Semester II, IV and VI) start in January. Students have to appear in two Sessional tests before commencement of the Semester End Examinations. For odd Semesters, these Tests are held in the early part of September and towards the last part of October. For even Semesters, Sessional tests are held in February and April. Information regarding the Sessional and Semester End examinations is accessible to the students well in advance as the same is clearly stated in the college prospectus.

Most of our students belong to the families of weavers and farmers. They are all day-scholars. Keeping in mind their convenience to attend the classes, we begin our teaching schedule from 9:30 a.m. and end the same by 4:45 p.m. all six days of the week. Schedule for Sessional Tests are considered as mile-stones since certain pre-determined units of the course-contents are to be completed within the stipulated time. Since the system in vogue relies on the credit-based system, number of classes to be delivered on certain contents is guided by the number of credits assigned to it. Accordingly, all the departments prepare their teaching plan.

We have so far two class rooms equipped with digital smart board devices. The class routine is designed in such a way so as to enable the majority of the classes to avail this facility. It needs to be mentioned here that the first two periods in the class routine are of 60 minutes each so that the teachers involved can conveniently manage the classes with the help of the available digital devices. The rest of the classes are of 45 minutes duration.

Recently, we have resolved to develop a question-bank for each subject the faculties of the teaching departments with the help of the faculty members of the various departments. Applications of the items of the question bank are done time to time. Exposure to such items is expected to improve the achievement of the students.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching- learning process?

- The IQAC is an in-house authority aiming at improving quality of teaching-learning process in the college. It monitors the need for different teaching-learning tools and pressurises the college authority to encourage the maximum utilisation of such tools by the teachers and the students for the teaching-learning process to be more effective and fruitful. The following are the major role played by the IQAC in improving Teaching-Learning process.
 - Monitoring the daily progress report of every faculty member in a prescribed format known as 'Academic Audit'.
 - Maintain the Self-Appraisal Report of every individual faculty.
 - Maintain a close contact with the Students' Union body.
 - Organise parent-teacher meet and alumni meet for over-all academic development.
 - The IQAC maintains a close contact with the UGC and the parent University to get up-to-date information uploaded on academic matters and thereby informs the faculty members for their proper implementation.

- The IQAC also takes necessary actions on the basis of students' feedback on teachers and the courses and informs the college authority and the individual teacher of the necessary remedial measure to be taken.
- The IQAC coordinators attend seminars related to IQAC organized by different institution to get the up-to-date information on NAAC-related guidelines for the over-all academic and administrative development of the institution.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? (Give details on the support structures to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

- The traditional so called "talk and chalk" method is more or less still maintaining domination in the class-room teaching. With the advanced application of ICT tools in class-room learning, the situation has begun to change gradually. Yes, we have no hesitation to state that we have miles to go in order to provide such facilities as required. Yet our effort in this direction has got momentum and we are on the track now, and hopefully, will be able to bring a remarkable change in the near future. Judicious application of such tools in the classrooms breaks the monotony in the class giving the students ample scope to become active learners in the classroom. Steps taken up in order to develop interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning are as follows:
 - 1. Group Discussions are organized among the students by various departments. (for example, Education and English),
 - 2. Preparation and presentation of Seminar Papers in the Departmental Seminars:

Virtual laboratories, e-learning, Resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), Open Educational Resources, Mobile Education, etc.
- As stated earlier, modern technology in Teaching-Learning practices has begun to have its place in our classrooms. Being an institution of higher learning located in an exclusively rural area, the wave of digitalization and electronic media has obviously reached us in relatively later time and at a slower pace. The curse of being rural has not spared us to have better internet connectivity, not to say of common telephone service. Though the private service providers are trying to find out its place on purely commercial motive, the service provider under the public sector (BSNL) is found to be incompetent to meet our demand.

Keeping all such limitations aside, we are trying our level best to be benefitted by the emerging trend of digitalized and electronic audio-visual aids. The present status of this institution in this regard is presented below:

- Separate computer-sets with required software to use for Teaching-Learning purpose in all the departments.
- Two fully equipped classrooms with digital smart-boards.

A language laboratory with seven sets of computer.

- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/ methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
- Evaluation system at Under-Graduate level has undergone a massive change in the colleges of Gauhati University. The traditional essay-type patterns of items in the examinations are phased out and replaced by very short and objective-type of items: the entailing effect of which is seen in the pedagogy of Under-Graduate level. The dominance of traditional lecture method has begun to recede and teachers are gradually switching over from the previous teaching method to new ones so that students can remain in fine tune with the emerging approach of evaluation. The delivery of lecture on the content is now being assembled with identifying the very short and objective (probable) items and a continued exercise to answer to those.

Emergence of technology in the field of Teaching Learning process also has paved the way for a change in teaching practices. Acquisition of some of such equipments by the college has developed a motivation among some of the teachers to keep themselves well accustomed in their meaningful use. Following are the efforts made by the institution for motivating the teachers in the direction of innovative teaching methods:

1) Teachers are allowed to take part in various professional /career development programmes conducted by different organisations on such theme.

- 2) An Orientation Programme was conducted in the Computer Science Department of the college on the application of power-point in teaching-learning process. The programme was held on 12/09/2012 with a total number of 35 participants from the teachers of the college.
- 3) Two well-equipped classrooms are developed with the facilities of digital smart- board coupled with eye-sight device.
- 4) Large classrooms are equipped with sound-systems with a view to ensure the audibility of teachers' lecture from each and every position of the classroom. Impact of such efforts may be enumerated as follows:
 - Almost all the teachers are coming forward to use the tools and techniques available.
 - Access to e-journals by teachers has been escalating.
 - Students' attendance in the class has substantially increased.
 - Active participation of students in classroom learning has gone up.
 - Students' achievements are improving.
 - Enrolment in the college has increased over the years.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching learning process?

The college has rich library resources to augment the teaching —learning process. The students are entitled to borrow two books against cards issued to them at the time of admission. There is free accessibility to the students and the teachers to the reading room where they are allowed to go through the available books from the library. The students and teachers can also avail themselves of making copies of their studying materials with the help of the Xerox machine present in the library at a much cheaper rate. Moreover, internet connectivity is also available in the reading-room of the library.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curricular within the planned time-frame and calendar? If yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institution's approaches to overcome these.

- The challenges faced by the institution in completing the curriculum within the planned time-frame are basically of two types:
 - (1) Universal (Common)
 - (2) Local (Area Specific)

Most of the provincialised colleges in Assam like ours are compelled to impart +2 level educations with arrangement for extra teachers for the purpose.

- Consequently, teachers' attention and service is considerably slowed down by these two classes.
- The local cause (area specific) includes unscheduled 'bandhs' called by the various agitating groups. The socio-political situation in Assam has continued to remain volatile for the last few decades. Declaration of 'bandhs' by some agitating group is quite frequent now-a-days. On the day(s) of such unscheduled 'bandhs', all the different means of transportation remain off the road. As a result students' attendance is rather disheartening.

- To overcome these challenges, the Institution has initiated a few remedial steps:
 - a) Special/extended classes are taken.
 - **b)** Official cooperation/support to such 'bandhs' is not extended.
 - c) Utmost care is taken to ensure that teaching-plan of the Department do not suffer.

2.3.11 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- Continuous monitoring of students' achievement has been made in every paper of the teaching Department as a phase of academic audit. It includes:
 - Quality of the teaching learning progression of each individual teacher
 - Transparency in the student's progression report in the examination
 - Daily class records of the individual teacher
 - Formulation of the Question Bank with probable questionnaires for under-Graduate classes

Moreover, remedial and tutorial classes have been started and offered to students who need special attention.

Students' feedback is received from students in regard to classroom teaching performance of the teacher.

2.4 Teacher Quality

- 2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and arrangement (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.
- Continuous professional growth of teaching personality is a felt need of the hour.

 Curriculum change caused by introduction of Semester system, new evaluation

methodology adopted by Gauhati University and emergence of e-equipments in the teaching-learning practices are some of the reflections of the demands that necessitate continuous improvement in teaching resources. However being an institution located in a basically rural area, provision for improvement at the local level is quite inadequate for us. Yet, we encourage our teachers to take part in such agenda. A reflection of our teachers' participation in such programmes is given below.

- Success of strategies for enhancement of quality of teachers is obviously an outcome of bilateral effort, in which the authority, administration and the individual teacher are involved as major role-player. The role of the administration of the college is always found encouraging and no single instance of disallowing any teacher in this regard is in record.

The role of the Institution in the promotion of such talent is too welcoming and supportive. Persons with such abilities are always provided with best administrative support in getting permission, headquarter leaves, official leaves, etc., from the superior authority. Sometimes even leave is granted beforehand in the anticipation that it will be approved by the superior authority. Support is also offered to avail financial grants from the agency like the UGC. The Institution always publicly celebrates such achievements in honour of the awardees with a view to motivate more teachers in the days to come.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The college has introduced the evaluation of teachers by supplying sets of questionnaire to the students (Major and General) in every Semester at the end of completion of the courses. The returned Feedback forms are then collected and analysed at the departmental level for remedial measures for the future.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms:

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution, especially students and faculty, are aware of the evaluation processes?

The Institution is serious and very careful in disseminating the information in regard to evaluation processes among the students and the teachers. The steps taken in this regard are:

- Tentative schedule of examinations, both Sessional and Semester End are incorporated to the academic calendar which is published in the Admission prospectus of the institution.
- Preliminary exposure to the patterns of questions/items set for the exams are given in the pre admission counseling session.
- Students are also provided with required information by the office of the Principal regard to formalities for getting answer scripts reevaluation etc.
- Teachers are also provided with leave on duty to take part in workshop etc. on exam reform.
- The Exam Board of the College also plays role of facilitator of information on evaluation process.
- Sessional Tests conducted by the college offers the information regarding the patterns of the University Exams as the first one is conducted in the same line of University Exam in repeat pattern of items evaluation/scoring technique is concerned by the Institution itself.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

- ➤ With the introduction of Semester System from 2011-12 academic sessions at Under Graduate level by Gauhati University the entire evaluation system has undergone a massive change.
 - Annualised final examination under Three year Degree come (TDC)
 has been replaced by Semester-End examination conducted twice a
 year at the end of the Semesters. Thus the frequency of examination is
 increased
 - The CGPA concept has merged to replace the traditional percentage of score concept (Absolute Percentage).

- The age-old concept of awarding class distinction as a differential indicator has been abandoned
- The pressure of core subject like English as a second language is minimized.
- Continuous evaluation (with the addition scores sessional tests to the Semester- End test).
- Change in the patterns of questions from traditional essay-type to very short and objective type is also a new initiative in the merging system.

Reforms initiated in our institution:

- Continuous monitoring of students' progression by means of selfdesigned Academic Audit
- Development of Question Bank system with a view to familiarize to the students with probable questions as much as possible
- Emphasis on changing teaching approached from traditional lecture method objective analysis of contents
- To involve more teachers in conduct of examinations

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- Ensuring the participation of all teachers in different capacities and performance of assigned evaluation duty compulsorily is our basic principle to ensue effective implementation of reforms in evaluation system. The approaches in detail taken up in this regard are as follows:
 - Orientation of young teachers in setting up of question papers for the internal exams under the supervision of Head of the Departments and senior teachers of the respective Department mostly at informal level is done.
 - We timely respond to University notices requesting name of teachers for recruitment of examination duties.

- Teachers engaged by University for evaluation duty are allowed duty leave accordingly.
- All teachers assigned with evaluation of answer scripts of the sessional tests.
- Timely completion of assigned duties is strictly monitored.
- Teachers engaged in conduct of examination are done on rotation basis so as to democratise of participation of all teachers in responsible capacities.
- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure students' achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.
- Prior to conduct of Semester-End Examinations, two Sessional Tests are held.
 - Sessional tests are of within the range of 10-20 marks.
 - Evaluated scripts are shown to students so as to apprise them of their strengths and weaknesses.
 - Conduct of such tests at a regulated interval ensures better study habit of the students.
 - Level of achievement of the students helps the teachers to be aware of the quality of the learners and accordingly they may adjust their teaching strategy.
 - Our mechanism of Academic Audit plays an effective role in maintaining and monitoring the students' achievement.
- 2.5.6 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme? 2.5.8 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightage assigned for the overall development of students.

The college maintains rigor and transparency in publishing departmental examinations results and supplying answer scripts to the students. The entire assessment process of final

examination is prepared by the parent university. The semester system introduced from 2011 in the college. The system introduce in the under-graduate level with Credit and Grading system in which weightage is given in the form of marks to students. The internal assessment is monitored by the HODs and Principal to ensure rigor and transparency in the internal assessment.

Yes, it is reflected in their final examination result. Marks obtain by a student in the internal examinations are used to evaluate the performance of the students. This will help to identify the students for special and remedial classes.

Each department analyzed the results of their students and accordingly it provides an insight into the learning objectives and planning.

In every final examination results, the Principal of the college conduct a general meeting with the staff, review the results and then necessary measures are taken to improve the results by arranging remedial and tutorial classes.

The evaluation of Undergraduate programme is carried out centrally by the Gauhati University. As per the University rules, an aggrieved student can apply for re-evaluation of papers after paying a nominal fee. The College even has the provision of showing the evaluated answer-scripts of the Internal Examination to satisfy the students.

Yes, the students and the staff are aware of the learning outcome as it is displayed in the Notice Board.

Teaching-learning assessment strategies are structured after resolutions adopted in the Academic Meeting convened by the Principal. For the achievement of the intended learning outcomes the college provided various facilities to the learners of the college. There is library facility, internet facility, Student Welfare Fund for the needy students. The student centric teaching learning process, the ICT based classrooms helps in meeting the goals of the teaching learning process. The evaluation process of internal examination, methodology adopted in setting of question papers etc.helps into achieves the indented learning outcome.

2.6.3 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

- The college conducts counseling programmes to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses before admission of the students to the undergraduate level every year. It also takes up various programmes to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered like:
 - 1) Quality Jobs: The Carrier Guidance and Counseling Cell takes the responsibility by conducting professional programmes, inviting different professionals from a verity of sectors like Defense, Banking Air force etc.

- **2) Entrepreneurship**: The Department OF Economics arranged different talks and expert lectures and educational tours which promote and motivate entrepreneurship.
- 3) Innovation: The College arranged study tours, industrial visits, organized seminars and workshops for students so as to acquaint them with different fields and enable them to enter after completion of their programmes.
- **4) Research Aptitude**: According to the course curriculum students are encouraged to take up primary data based projects works. They are also guided and encouraged to participate different competition organized by other institutions. All these bring research aptitude among the students.

2.6.4 How does the institution collect and analyze data on students' learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The college collect and analysis the data on students' learning outcomes by analyzing their Final Examinations results conducted by Gauhati University. Moreover according to the need of the students, remedial classes are organized. Reading materials, probable questioner, personal guidance etc. also made available to the students to overcoming barriers of learning.

2.6.5 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The college monitors the achievement of learning outcome by verification and analysis academic audit report. Besides this the college evaluate the achievement of learning outcomes of the students through conducting internal examination, project works, home assignment etc, and through the conduction of different programmes for both academic and personality development of students. Each department analyzed the results of final examination of each semester to ensure the achievement of learning outcomes. Efforts are made for improvement of quality outcome.

The graduate attribute by the college are highest CGPA. To answer these, the college makes utmost efforts to finish the courses in time. Remedial and tutorial classes also conducted for attaining the high CGPA by the students. The college invites eminent personalities to the seminars and workshops, conducts programs on Carrier Guidance, library, books, newspapers, internet facilities easily accessible to the student's. All this helps in ensuring the attainment of the graduate attributes specified by the college.

- ❖ To monitor and review the standard of research reflected in the proposals as per the UGC Guideline

- ❖ To circulate and provide up-to date UGC guideline and notification to the faculty members
- ❖ To recommend suggestions so as to maintain qualitative improvement of the research project submitted by the faculty members

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research scheme / projects?

- The College authority provides all the necessary arrangements for the smooth progress of the research projects. The arrangements provided by the authority includes the release of funds to the particular investigator, guiding the investigators to complete the projects within the stipulated time, inspiration and moral support to the researchers to publish their findings in journals, books, etc. Moreover, the measures taken by the Institution to facilitate the smooth progress and implementation of research scheme / projects may be specified as follows:
 - (i) Autonomy to the researchers to the maximum possible extent

 - (iii) Providing adequate infrastructural facilities

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by Institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The provision for research activity has been provided in the syllabus of course content meant for UG students of Gauhati University. There is a compulsory project paper in the Major course of most of the departments. The curriculum itself is a source of promoting research spirit among both the teachers and students. Students are there by, well acquainted with the basics of research during the course of pursuing research activities for the fulfillment of requirement of the project paper. The institution thus moulds the base of future research activities of the students. Even then practical experiment in the laboratory specifically for the science students, field study on environment both for Arts and Science students and preparation of reports correspondingly may be considered as the initial stage flourishing the environment of research among them. The Department of Education has a laboratory of psychology experiments which definitely helps in developing scientific temper among the students towards the understanding of human behaviour. Moreover the various Science departments engage the students through their participation on their departmental seminars which is meant for the students to develop scientific temper and research culture. The Seminar Presentation Method of Teaching is also followed by the teachers which also indirectly helps the students to grow the research spirit among them.

3.3 Infrastructure for Research

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

For the students and researchers, the Central Library of the College provides the facilities like up-to-date books and journals, internet facilities and reading room.

As the Science stream of the College is newly recognized, the development of the laboratories and other infrastructural facilities are still going on. For the establishment of

research facilities in the College, the authority has communicated with various organisations for their financial help.

The College Principal and some senior faculty members of Arts stream have the research guidance and under their supervision many scholars are doing research for their PhD programme.

The College authority has tried to provide the necessary infrastructural facilities to respective faculties to meet their needs. For future planning the authority has correspondence with UGC, DBT, etc. for their financial help to create a better infrastructural facilities including laboratory, digital library and so on.

communities related to the famous silk industry of Sualkuchi area could be considered as one of the best examples in this regard.

The faculty members of the College have been trying to publish a research journal during the last decade. The College authority is going to bear all the expenditure for the journal and look after all the aspects of financial management for the same.

3.5 Consultancy

3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute-Industry Interface?

No clear cut strategies are there in the concerned queries.

- 3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the Institution to promote consultancy? How is the expertise advocated and publicized?
- There is no distinct policy in response to the query.
- 3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?
- Due to the hectic academic schedule of the College, the teaching faculties do not get any opportunity to engage themselves whole heartedly in consultancy services. In spite of this hectic schedule, some of the faculties are casually engaged in coaching for the candidates of TET examination. A minimum of two faculty members of the college are appointed every year for consultancy services for the entry in services and employment generation scheme through the Career Counseling and Guidance Cell of the College. Some of the faculties have also rendered their services in teaching in Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University (KKHSOU) and Institute of Open and Distance Learning (IDOL) of Gauhati University. Moreover, PGDCA and BCA courses are taught by the faculties of Computer Science Department.
- 3.5.4 List the broad areas and major consultancy services provided by the Institution and the revenue generated during the last four years.
- No revenue is generated during the last four years due to major consultancy services.
- 3.5.5 What is the policy of the Institution in sharing the income generated through consultancy (staff involved: Institution) and its use for Institutional development?
- Framing of such a policy does not arise since the consultancy services are provided free of cost.
- 3.6 Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) and Extension Activities
- 3.6.1 How does the Institution promote Institution-achieverhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic developments of students?

- The very name of the Institution Sualkuchi Budram Madhab Satradhikar Mahavidyalaya is a symbolic representation of the institution of the community. Satradhikar Budram and Madhab of the Iswar Sri Sri Hatisatra were the religious leaders of the locality. On the donation of land by these saints, the College has originated and thereby has a strong grounding of social representation. The local people and students community of the College work together inspired by the ideology of Satradhikar's philosophy of developing the local community with the broad objective of inspiring the students to be good citizen of the future. Thereby the College from time to time organises various programmes, discussion, etc. on certain particular matters and topics which are essentially related with the local handloom industry with the purpose of benefitting the local people.
 - Being the only institution of higher education the college disseminates knowledge
 among the young generation through its education. Apart from science and arts
 stream providing degree courses on various major subjects the College also takes
 the responsibility for disseminating education to the local community through its
 K.K.H.S.O.U. branch of non-formal education.
 - From time to time the Women Cell of the College under the aegis of the authority
 organises certain programmes and talks involving the female sections of the
 society with the purpose of developing consciousness towards social life among
 them.
 - Keeping relation with the Golden Jubilee Celebration, the Health Sub-Committee
 has under a programme of free eye-check up in collaboration with Lions' Club,
 Kamrupa. Afterwards the needed next phases of treatment were completed by the
 Lions' Club, Kamrupa in a phase wise.
 - The Institution organises AIDS awareness programmes inviting the doctors of Local PHC as resource persons for creating awareness regarding AIDS among the young generation of the present society involving the local people.
 - The various cultural programme and competitions organized by the Institution organises the time of College-Week, freshmen's social and thereby develops a spirit of cohesive living among the student community of the Institution.
 - The Study Circle of the College has organised annually Ranjit Choudhury
 Memorial All Assam Inter-College Debate Competition course actively for four

years. Moreover, the Circle has organised workshops on short story writing, and Borgeet, art competition, quiz and other literary competitions, lectures on relevant topics from time to time. All these diversified activities and programmes are carried out by the College with the mission of promoting holistic development as well as activating moral and aesthetic values towards realizing the fundamental and obligations of good citizenship.

- The NCC unit of the College has organised programmes like tree plantation and cleanliness drive from time to time. Besides the NCC wing of the College participates in various training camps throughout the country. Coordinators of the NCC wing of the College have attended various training programmes.
- The major programmes organized by the NSS unit of the College during 2010-2014 include quiz competitions, literary competitions, training in disaster management, AIDS awareness programme, adoption of model village. Dr. Bhupen Hazarika song competition (2013) cleanliness and beautification drive inside the college campus before celebration of various occasion, such as College Week, freshmen's social, Saraswati Puja, etc. tree plantation on the occasion of Environmental Day celebration, Awareness programme on voluntary blood donation, peace rally on protest against violence on women.
- The NSS, NCC and Red Ribbon club jointly has organized awareness programmes on voluntary blood donation.

3.6.2 What is the institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements/ activities which promote citizenship roles?

Along with authority and College family the Union Body of students plays an integral part in College administration. The future leadership training is received by the students in a very democratic way in the College environment through participation in election process of Students' Union Body, thereby constituting the body and henceforth providing healthy leadership. The election of Union Body is a totally democratic one. It helps in the development of awareness among the students regarding their roles and duties as future citizens. The Institution organized programmes like celebration of environment day, woman's day, international AIDS day, teachers day, Gandhi Jayanti, Silpi Divas, Rabha Divas,

Independence Day, Republic Day, College Foundation day, birth day of Bhupen Hazarika, etc.promotes social awareness among students which in turn definitely help students to be good and effective citizen of the country.

3.6.3. How does the Institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the Institution?

The Institution solicits stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the Institution in the form of parents-teachers' meet, local people representation on the different bodies and committees like Governing Body, IQAC, Central committee of H.S. Final examination, Golden Jubilee Celebration committees, celebration of foundation day, with full co-operation of Sri Sri Hati Satra and local people. Invitation of local people as well as the local reporters of newspapers, TV Channel in the different programmes organized by the College and thereby inviting their full co-operation and suggestion for the constructive development of the college.

Alumni Association of the College is a greater source of strength and inspiration for the College community. The Association acts as a bridge between the College and the local community. Some of the members of the Association are very active and participate in the various programmes and activities of the College whole-heartedly and also contribute with their valuable suggestions.

3.6.4. How does the Institution plan and organise its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details of last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

The Institution has the plan to organise its extension an outreach programmes. As the only educational Institution is a rural based area our College realizes this fact that we have to work for the overall upliftment of these local [people. It is also needless to maintain that our

College was at first established by the local people with their physical, mental and monetary support over and above being endowed with a 42 bighas of land granted by the local Satra, Ishwar Sri Sri Hati Satra. Keeping all these things in mind, our College organises various extension and outreach programmes for the benefit of the people.

- The NSS Unit has adopted a village Rawanboi which is three kms. away from the College and has as many as 200 families of different castes. The programme of the adoption of this village was held from the 18th to 24th December, 2013. Some of the activities in which the volunteers participated in were cleanliness drive, tree plantation, and free health check-up, distribution of free medicines, yoga and meditation and demonstration of Vermicompost.
- Fifty students of the College took part in a rally "Jibanar Babe Akhoj"—an awareness programme on AIDS and blood donation which was held on 5th February, 2014.
- Two students participated in the "North East Youth Festival" which was organised by NSS under the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports of Central Government from the 2nd to the 8th, February, 2014, at Aizawl, Mizoram.
- NSS orientation training was organised in Guwahati College from 8th to 9th, October, 2013, in which two of our students participated.
- Orientation Course for Program Officer- Held at IIE, Guwahati from 2nd to 8th March, 2014.
- Blood Donation Camp was organised by the NSS Unit of the College on 24th
 September 2014. 48 students and the teachers donated their blood on that day.
- Before Blood Donation, an awareness programme on blood donation was held on 22nd September 2014 at the College premises.

3.6.5. How does the Institution promote the participation of students and faculty/ extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other national/ international agencies?

As a part of non-formal education, this center of KKHSOU provides educational facilities to all sections of society irrespective of age groups, class, religion, caste, etc. thereby benefitting the people who remain deprived of education due to some obstacles in their normal age of receiving formal education

The emerging trend in teaching-learning practices, enhancement in enrolment and expansion programmes/ discipline etc., are the major points of concern in formulation of policy for creation and enhancement of infrastructure in order to ensure quality teaching learning practice. Inspite of our resource constraints, our endeavor to move forward in this direction are always on, which is evidenced in the tasks we have completed in the recent past years. Replacement of old model furniture by modern ones is a phased manner, modern electronic equipments for class-room teaching etc., are the reflection of our policy followed in this line under question.

The Institution has a well formulated policy for creation and enhancement of infrastructure. The authority in collaboration with the IQAC which include all the Heads of the Departments as core members along with the various Committees device a lay-out of the plan which is forwarded to the Governing Body for further discussion and approval. The requisite plan for developing the infrastructure of the college as designed by the planning committee and the infrastructure committee next calls out to the authority who deliberates with the Governing Body. After the approval, the entire plane is tabled at the deliberation of the Construction Committee and the Purchasing Committee. The financial requirement as demanded for infrastructure development is met with by the College Development Fund, but the major contribution is made by the UGC grants and other Government funding agencies. Besides the authority also submits plan proposal for the introduction of Vocational and Add-on courses under the plan period.

The requirement at all departmental levels, the library as well as the office and the material needs of the students are met with by the College Development Fund.

4.1.4. How does the Institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

Only the ramp facilities are available for such students to have safe and convenient access to their class rooms.

4.1.5. Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them.

The Institution is privileged to have a girl's hostel under UGC grant, the intake capacity being 25 (Twenty five). However the project is yet to be completed except the ground floor.

The institution was sanctioned an amount of thirty lakhs (Rs. 30 lakhs) during XI plan period, and of which 27 lakh has been released. Initially the provision was proposed for 25 inmates. The fact is that the amount given during the XI Plan period was not

sufficient at all to make the hostel well furnished. Subsequently during XII Plan period, a proposal for its expansion and completion was placed before UGC looking for release of seventy lakhs (Rs.70 lakhs). This time the UGC has sanctioned fifty lakhs (Rs. 50 lakhs) and 50% of the sanctioned amount has been released already. The expansion work is in progress. That is why; no girl student could be admitted to the Girls' hostel this year. With the completion of the project, hopefully more girl students will come up for hostel provision.

4.1.6. What is the provision made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The college is equipped with first-aid facilities. There is also a Health Cell within the College Campus where the students as well as staff can avail themselves of free medical check- up and treatment every Wednesday. We are fortunate enough to have an appointed visiting physician, Dr. D. Das, from Mahatma Gandhi 30 Bedded Rural Hospital. A Govt. Hospital is available within ½ K.M of the campus which is easily accessible to the students and employees of the college. In case of any emergency demand for health services, patient is sent to the local hospital so as to get better health support.

Besides, the college provides facilities for yoga and gymnasium, both for students and staff within the campus. The local Hospital extends its official support whenever require. Besides, the college also launches free medical camp on and off the campus.

4.1.7. 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1. Does the library have an Advisory committee? Specify the composition of such a committee. What significant initiatives have been implemented by the committee to render the library, student/user friendly?

Yes, the college library has a 15 numbers Advisory committee for the smooth functioning of the activities. The committee consists of the Principal as president, Librarian as secretary and all Heads of the respective departments as members.

The Advisory committee has undertaken considerable initiative to render the library user-friendly. The committee formulated policies for management and governance of the library, preparation of annual report and the budget, purchasing of books and journals and drafting rules and regulations for the library.

In order to render the library user- friendly, its services are open throughout the working hours as well as during the vacation. Students can read the benefit of issuing books even during the time of examination and also utilize the library for references. The reading room is at the disposal of students and other users anytime between the working hours. Days are demarcated for students of each semester as well as higher secondary students so as to avoid cluttering of the library. To enable quick access to the books and references the library is at an advantage to be equipped with cataloging system. List of books and references are provided every academic session which keeps the library updated.

The library is equipped with a reading room which has reading carrels arranged in rows so as to accommodate more students at a time. There is an enclosure within the reading room used as an internet zone provided with five computers for public access. The other wing of the library is used as the stack room where books are stored in racks and almirahs. The transaction of books is done through the circulation section. Users can avail xerox facility at the Xerox zone at concessional rate.

The reading room serves as a lounge area for browsing and relaxed reading.

Every member of the teaching faculty has been given an id-password against their individual e-mail account which enables them to access e-resources.

4.2.3. How does the library ensure purchase and use of current titles, print and e-journals and other reading materials? Specify the amount spent on procuring new books, journals and e-resources during the last four years.

- To ensure purchase and use of current titles, print and e-journals and other reading materials, the librarian holds meetings with the Library Advisory Committee where in the Principal remains as Chair person and all Heads of the teaching Departments are the members. The librarian is the convenor of this committee wherein the decision regarding purchase of reading and library materials are finalized. The major factors determining selection of library materials are:
 - Curriculum specific.
 - User-centric and potential for use.
 - Feasibility of selection of material
 - Quality, authoritativeness and accuracy as determined by review sources and bibliographic aids.
 - ❖ Determination and allocation of budget according to requirement.

At the onset of every academic session, students are given two orientation and awareness programmes regarding usage of library. For convenience, students are arranged in groups in both Degree and Higher Secondary levels.

There is no IUC Facilities available in the library.

4.2.7 Enumerate on the support provides by the Library staff to the students and teachers of the college.

- The college follows open access mode of service so as to enable teachers and students to locate the required library materials. The library staff is forever ready to extend their helping hand to the users. The following services are provided to the users:
 - a) Current awareness services through references
 - b) Selective information dissemination service
 - c) Bibliographic compilation service through standard format
 - d) Reprography service
 - e) Internet facility
 - f) Newspaper clippings services which are specifically college related.

Catering to the physically challenged students, the library staff extends its assistance in procuring library materials. Moreover, home delivery of books and Xerox materials and hand-outs are also done.

4.3.2 Detail on the computer and internet facility made available to the faculty and students on the campus and off campus?

The computer and internet facility is made available for the teachers and students in all the departments including computer center, IQAC cell and library. There is no off campus facility for computer and internet.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

Keeping in view the emerging trend of IT infrastructure, the college is in the process of developing an IT based automation in the whole system of the institution. For example, the office of the Principal has moved forward in the Office Documentation process and expected to be fully automated in near future. Similarly, the library deploys automated tools to provide maximum access to library allocation. The college library is in the process of digitalizing its resources. The college library has adopted the online public access cataloging system (OPAC). This has been linked up to the various computer devices of the institution which enables easy access to the library resources. All the department have been provided with computers which enables the teacher to prepare teaching learning materials, preparing teaching plan, preparing question bank for internal assessment, test and to set model question papers, etc. The internet facility available in the college is used by the faculty members for research work and for planning their teaching —learning methods. There is a provision of power point presentation with LCD projector available in the classroom of the institution. There is a seminar-cum-classroom where an IT enabled arrangement is made available for academic as well as for conducting seminars, workshops etc. Moreover, there is the provision of smart board classroom facility in the institution so as to make the teachinglearning process effective.

Besides, the institution started a self- financing certificate course in Diploma in Computer Application (DCA), which is mandatory for Higher Secondary level students. As far as the degree level students, the college introduced Bachelor of Computer Application (BCA) which is affiliated under Gauhati University. There is also a Post

Graduate Diploma Course in Computer application (PGDCA) running successfully with an objective to enrich the employability of passed out students.

4.3.5. How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/learning materials by its staff and students?

The institution facilitates ICT enabled classrooms for enriching the teaching learning process. There is a provision of smart class to each department allotted in the routine.

Each department has Internet facility to carry out the academic activities including research. Digital boards have been added to upgrade the IT infrastructure facilities. Smart Board, Internet facility, laptops, LCD projectors etc. are provided to the students and the staff to enhance the quality of teaching learning and research. The area of

Phonology prescribed in Communicative English has been taught in the Language lab. using ICT focusing on various aspects like sound, pronunciation, etc.

These facilities help the teachers to transform the traditional method of teaching, so as to help the students to understand the chapter easily.

- 4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching-learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.
- Being the facilitator of the teaching —learning process our teachers are striving to fulfill the demand of using the IT enabled class room facilities to cope up with the emerging trend of teaching-learning process by self-updating/undergoing training for their skill development in handling the IT devices.

4.4.2. What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure facilities of the college?

The Institution maintains a formal mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure facilities and equipment of the college. Regular meetings of the Planning Committee, Construction Committee and Purchasing Committee bring to lift the various requirements for enhancing and improving the infrastructure of the Institution. The already existing equipments are from time to time maintained, renovated and replaced and new purchases are made on discussion of the different committees with the authority. This also includes accessories of class room, teachers' common room, students' common rooms, library, laboratories, gymnasium, office, departmental rooms and lavatories. The various committees ensure that potable drinking water facilities and

generator services are in working condition. For ensuring discipline and security, gates are kept vigil by the gate- keeper. Since the land area of the college is expansive, the construction of boundary- wall is being done in phases. For ensuring of eco-friendly atmosphere within the campus, greenery is maintained. Besides the college campus is kept clean by formally appointed staff. At every strategic corner, waste-bins are installed. The college fishery is disinfected and cleaned regularly.

The over-head tanks are cleaned at regular intervals. Maintenance of the IT section is done specifically by outsourcing specialized technicians.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment / instruments?

The institution consciously takes up calibration and other precision measures for equipment/ instruments through annual maintenance and recycling and disposal of unused gadgets and equipments. As time and situation demand, the maintenance is sometimes done intermittently before the stipulated time.

For the location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment such as generator and water supply, the institution is cautious to keep the generator pollution free and has been installed at a safe distance, away from the main hub of the campus. Cleanliness of water supply system and technical wellbeing of generators, inverters are ensured through regular maintenance.

5.1.3. What are the special support services / facilities available for:

(a) Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections are provided with support facilities through scholarships, such as Government Scholarships, BPL Scholarships, Minorities' Scholarships, over and above being aided by the Welfare Fund of the Institution which provides books as well as financial assistance. Besides, the College Library and the Departmental Libraries are open to students of the general category and specifically to those hailing from weaker economic background. Personal guidance is provided to the students not only through conventional routine classes, but also through extra classes(tutorial and remedial).

The Institution takes special care to safeguard the interests of the students belonging to the SC, ST, OBC, the minorities' community and also the economically weaker sections. The Institution follows the guidelines of Government regarding the quota of reservation for the students. Seats are also especially reserved for them for admission to the Institution, as the College is surrounded by many villages where most people belong to the SC, ST, OBC, Minority Community as well as the economically weaker sections. Remedial classes are held in order to help them cope up with the syllabus especially targeting the Under Graduate Students.

During the XI Plan Period, Rs.1,60,000/-was sanctioned to the institution for remedial classes. Again Rs. 2,00,000/- has also been received for remedial coaching classes during the XII Plan period.

(e) Overseas Students

(h) Skill Development (Spoken English, Computer Literacy, etc.)

- The Department of English undertakes classes in Phonetics which is curriculum specific in B.Sc. Functional English.
- The Institution has a Language Laboratory which enables students to develop soft-skills.
- The College has introduced a One-Year Diploma Programme in Computer which is compulsory for both HS 1st Year Arts and Science students.
- The College has also introduced a Self-Financed Course in Bachelor of Computer Application (BCA) and Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Application (PGDCA) as full time course under the Gauhati University.
- The College also organises Inter-College Ranjit Choudhury Memorial Debating Competition once every year. Besides, Debating Competitions are also regularly organised during College Week on current and popular topics.
- Spoken English class has been introduced from the current year under the supervision of the Department of English.
- The Career Guidance and Counselling Cell of the College organises various Skill Development Programmes from time to time.
- Computer Literacy programmes for the students have been organized in collaboration with the Department of Computer Science of the College.

The Slow Learners are detected through Sessional tests and class-assignments. Tutorials and Remedial classes are taken by the teachers of the respective Departments. Reading materials are provided to the students over and above their availing the College and Departmental Libraries.

Remedial courses are conducted by the departments to bridge gap of knowledge especially for slow learners and departmental seminar for enrichment of knowledge on challenging issues are also conducted. The institution received UGC grants to conduct remedial classes under XII Plan period. Details are as follows:

5.1.4 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

Since the Institution is located amidst a rural yet business-oriented locality, majority of the households are well attuned to handloom and weaving. Keeping in view this aspect students are sent for training at the Sualkuchi Institute of Fashion Technology (SIFT) so as to involve and students to enhance their acumen in this field and to acquire professional expertise. Survey work is conducted to study the socio-economic well-being and the challenges confronting the local weavers.

The students were familiarized on Geographical Information and Patenting through a seminar conducted by the North-East Small Scale Industries Association. The seminar was not circumscription to the students alone, but also entrusted to benefit the public. However, as part of the foundation day celebration of the college illuminating lecture was delivered on Sualkuchi Handloom and Textile by the eminent economist, Professor Jayanta Madhab.

A lecture was delivered on "Breast Cancer and Cervical Cancer" by Dr. Jayantimala Chakravorty, organized by the Women Cell in association with the NGO, 'Rodali'.

- 5.1.7 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho, social etc.)
- Counselling services are made available to students such as:
 - Academic- At the time of admission, counseling regarding selection of subject-combinations is provided. The session begins with an inaugural speech by the Principal of the College. Thereafter each of the various departments provides valuable counseling to the newly-admitted students regarding their course-curriculum. Undergraduate students, for the first time, are to face the Semester system in their academic life. It is, therefore, a much felt need in order to acquaint the new-comers with the system so that, right from the very first day of their Undergraduate programme get themselves well adjusted in this new system. Faculty members from the respective departments hence offer counselling to the freshers.
 - Career- The Career-Counselling Cell provides information regarding the various job opportunities available. Moreover, prospects of entrepreneurship are also highlighted, the Institution being located amidst a business hub of handloom and weaving industry.
 - **Personal-** The exercise of counselling should always be strategic, right from identification; it should proceed with a roadmap so that the outcome of the whole application remains tangible. Personal counselling is therefore extended to students in distress and home visits are made so as to track the problems and try to ameliorate the psycho-social problems of the student concerned.

CRITERION-VI

GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1. Institutional Vision and Leadership

- 6.1.1. State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.
- As the only seat of higher education of the greater Sualkuchi locality, S.B.M.S. College aims to set a hallmark in the field of education, and to preserve, create and disseminate knowledge through teaching, learning, innovation and experimentation. It thus aims to create new vistas of opportunities for the upcoming generations, so that, they may acquire self-reliance and it may impart in them, faithfully and comprehensively, the accumulated conscience of modern human civilization in terms of cultural, scientific and technological experiences. The institution also strives hard to ensure skill, quality, courage, self-confidence, and determination in learners, thus enabling them to face the changing scenarios of the current socio-economic situation. It furthermore aspires to create scrupulous, responsible individuals leading a responsible society who would contribute to the advancement of the region, the state and the nation as a whole and thus in identifying a collaboration with the ever—sought desire for knowledge and progress of the human race.

6.1.2. What is the role of top management, Principal and faculty in design and implementation of the quality policy and plans?

The Governing Body (G.B) is the sole management authority of the college. This body consists of the President (nominated by DHE), Secretary (generally, the Principal), Vice-principal (ex-officio member), University nominees, two teacher representatives, three parent-guardian representatives (two male, one female) and a donor-member. The Governing Body represents the entire stake-holders of the college. All the plans and policies to ensure quality are designed by the body unanimously on the basis of the needs and merits of the college. The policies are implemented by the Principal with the help of sub-

committees (usually from faculty members) appointed by the G.B on the basis of their expertise. The structure of the G.B. should be as it is laid down by the Government.

The Governing Body (G.B) of the college is the immediate authority for smooth management of the college. However major administrative decision of the GB is execution able subject to approval of the Director of Higher Education, Assam.

The Principal is the Secretary to the G.B of the college. He is the anchor in day to day management of the college.

Two representatives of teachers, nominated by them remain as members to the G.B. Thus the teachers enjoy a good representation to the G.B.

In normal situation, meeting of the GB is held at least once in an interval of three months. But some time meeting of the GB is held even before that. Issues in the meeting of the G.B are generally raised by the Principal and Secretary. On threadbare discussion the G.B adopts resolution and the Principal is authorised to either timely implementation or seek for DHE's approval as the case may be. Thus the continuum of making and implementing quality policy is ensured.

In addition to all that the Principal sits in meeting with the teachers in order to exchange views on any development policy and accordingly he moves for subsequent steps in regard to implementation of the same.

6.1.4. What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate the policies and plans of the institution for their effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The Governing Body adopts procedures to monitor and evaluate the policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and necessary improvement with the cooperation

of different sub- committees headed by the Principal or the Vice-Principal of the college. The Principal holds meetings with the Heads of the Departments and/or coordinators of different sub- committees to monitor and evaluate the progress of action plans from time to time and also with the faculty members on academic matters at least twice an academic session, preferably at the beginning of each Semester.

Progress of implementation of development plans are discussed with the committee concerned. The committee concerned also takes on the sport stocks of progress. This practice is done as an interim approach till the subsequent sitting of the G.B. In the G.B meeting progress made is informed to the house and suggestions of the G.B in this regard are carried out timely.

The students and the Students' Union Body are given opportunity to ventilate their problems and requirements through meetings with the authority.

Such a platform is also provided to the other stake-holders namely, the alumni, the parents/guardians and the local luminaries in order to assess and monitor the progress of plans and policies. Finally all reports are placed before the Governing Body for final evaluation.

6.1.5. Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management.

- The management authority of the college plays an accommodative role in extending academic leadership to the faculty.
 - (i) It is authority of the college under whose pioneership the devices and strategies of academic audit (SBMSC Model) is being carried out.
 - (ii) The authority insists upon the faculty to apply for various schemes like FIP, Seminars and Workshops, etc.
 - (iii) Approval or forwarding, etc., required against the proposal of the faculty members is accorded instantly.
 - (iv) Study leave, etc., to incumbents is accorded once a proposal is granted by the granting authority.
 - (v) The college provides its faculty members attending conference, seminars etc. in a foreign country with a financial aid if the case is approved by U.G.C. However, the

faculty member concerned has to return the amount when the faculty member receives reimbursement from U.G.C.

The College management fully encourages and supports all the faculty members towards involvement in various activities of academic leadership. Faculty members are provided incentives to pursue research under renowned institutions for achieving leadership quality. The management facilitates faculty members to participate in various UGC career advancement programmes viz. Orientation Course, Refresher Course and Short Term Course of different Staff Colleges throughout the country. The college organizes seminars and workshops for enhancing the academic acumen of the faculty members who are also eager participants of national and international seminars, conferences, workshops, etc.

6.1.7. How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The college has a decentralized management and administrative governance system on which the departments and different units, cells, sub-committees have operational autonomy which is applied in conducting departmental seminars, academic field trips, and class-tests, besides routine college activities. All the heads-of- the-departments are the part of the college management and administration. Inclusion of faculty members in different sub-committees speaks of the autonomy. Allowing students to form their own Union is another example of autonomy too.

The college consists of multiple organs that enjoy full autonomy in its functioning, such

- i) The Study Circle
- ii) The Student Welfare Committee
- iii) The NSS Unit

The Study Circle is an organisation which functions independently. Its fund is raised from students' contribution. It arranges academic programme at least once in a year. The fund for its implementation of programme is released by the authority.

The Student Welfare Committee is also an autonomous committee within the college setup. Its fund is raised from students' contribution which is meant for support of the need ones of the students. The beneficiaries are selected by the committee itself. The NSS Unit enjoys autonomy to a great extent in implementing its extension activities.

The culture of participative management system has been imbibed by the college since its inception. Before the college came under the deficit-in-aid system and was provincialised by the Government of Assam, the college was managed by the people of the locality. More than one member in the top management body i.e., the Governing Body, are from the locality. Besides, the college regularly organises parents/guardians meet, alumni meet, students' union meet to give them liberty and opportunity to participate in the management of the college.

The College runs with its own perspective plans. Initially it was a single faculty with arts stream. Now it is a multi-faculty institution with science stream. It is trying for further expansion by introducing some vocational programme under Community College Scheme of the U.G.C. We are contemplating to go for B-Voc Programme and P.G. Programme. The

fact is that rationalisation of our future plan depends upon to a great extent on gesture of the various funding agencies including Government of Assam as we cannot raise funds from students beyond the limit.

The college has a perspective plan clearly stated in the master plan. The Governing Body identifies the priority aspects viewing the urgency of a given situation. These are mainly infrastructural aspects and the college envisages infrastructural development viz. building an auditorium, erecting of boundary wall, developing a sports field, etc.

a) Teaching Learning

The GB of the college tries to keep abreast of the emerging trend in the arena of teaching learning practice at higher education level. Accordingly, it approves for procurement of new inputs. The Principal in consultation with the representatives of the faculty members purchase the new equipments. In addition to that the institution inspires the teachers for their continuous growth in professional front by allowing them to take part in academic events, to organise such programme within the campus etc.

Apart from the traditional system of teaching-learning, the college has developed facilities like smart-class, power-point presentation through projectors, portable and fixed mike-systems. Besides, departmental seminars, group discussions, home assignments, field trips, study trips, remedial teaching, visit to cities of excellence, etc., are frequently organised to provide exposure to the student community.

b) Research and Development

The college has been trying its level best for the development of research and development during this period.

c) Community Engagement

The institution was established by the local public with their physical labour and financial support. In due course of time it was brought under the provision of grant-in-aid of Government of Assam and finally it is a provincialised college. Even then the involvement of the community member is not diminishing. Participation of the local dignitaries in its governance and development activities, donation for construction of classrooms and above all the huge quantum of landed property donated by the local religious institution "Hati Satra" are the everlasting testimony of community engagement in the college. Hall donated in fond memory of "Hrishikesh Lohit Dewan", class room contributed by the "Sarukhel Gayaray" a social organisation of Sarukhel locality of Sualkuchi, classroom donated by Mr. Narayan Ch. Baishya of Bongshar etc., are worth mentioning.


d) Human Resource Management


The college has a decentralised management system and provides operational autonomy to human resources of the college.

The Human Resource available to the college is a conglomeration of individuals with varied quality and expertise, entrusted with specific responsibilities. The Principal is the overall head in day to day functioning of the college. His primary responsibility is of basically two types, i.e., academic and administrative. The academic responsibility is delegated to the faculties of the teaching departments under the captainship of Head of the Departments (HoD). The HoDs again distribute the responsibility among the fellow colleagues keeping in view the timely and effective discharge of duty.

The Vice-Principal, who is the senior most among the faculty members, is entrusted to look after the smooth running of the day-to-day academic activities.

The administrative responsibility of the Principal is carried out with the clerical support from Assistant level employees. In both the nature of jobs i.e., academic and administrative, subordinate level staffs are there. However, in addition to all that Central Library of the institution is there under the captainship of a librarian supported by an assistant and two subordinate level workers





e) Industry Interaction

The college has not established any direct interaction with the industry so far. But few awareness and motivation training programmes towards entrepreneurship have been conducted, students received training in natural dyeing from the SIFT (Sualkuchi Institute of Fashion Technology).

- In the session 2013-14, there were six (6) meetings of G.B. and eighty five (85)number of resolutions were adopted in different aspects of the college such as construction, approval of expenditure, promotion of teaching staff, advertisement for FIP vacancy, interview and appointment against FIP vacancy in the Department of Economics, Provincialization of the Science Stream, approval of the Vice-Principal, matters relating to the Golden Jubilee, matters regarding NAAC visit, NOC for Ph.D., renovation of class rooms etc. All above mentioned resolutions have been well implemented. There are several other resolutions such as advertisement for the vacancy in the department of History, interview for the vacancy of a 4th grade post, appointment of part-time faculty members, etc. These resolutions have been implemented too.
- 6.2.8. Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If "yes", what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

No institution affiliated to Gauhati University is so far accorded the autonomous status. Hence initiations in this direction have never been made.

6.2.9. How does the institution ensure that grievances/ complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances for promoting better stake-holder relationship?

The College has a mechanism of its own to redress the grievance of all its students. For this a 'Grievance Redressal Cell' was formed taking the Principal as its Chairperson. Along with him the Vice-Principal and three senior HODs are there for smooth functioning of the cell. Moreover, the President and Secretary of the Women Cell are ex-officio members of the Grievance Redressal Cell. A grievance should reach the Principal within 7 (Seven) working days in order to provide justice to the stake-holders.

Once a grievance is reported, the Principal along with the members of the Grievance Redressal Cell takes hearing of the parties. If the grievance is amongst them and guardians' cognizance is needed, it is done for effective resolution of the problem.

6.2.10. During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the court on these?

- There had not been any court cases against the college during the last four years.
- 6.2.11. Does the institution have a mechanism for analysing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?
- The College has an effective mechanism and management system for analysing feedback from students. Students' feedbacks were reported to the G.B and accordingly G.B authorised the Principal to do the best possible effort for redressal of the feedback. Already our effort is going on to mitigate the problems and has achieved a good stride in this regard. The major outcomes of the student feedback are as follows:
 - 1. Well-equipped class rooms
 - 2. Canteen facility

- 3. Renovation of the girls' common room
- 4. Renovation of sanitary system
- 5. Upgradation of other facilities in the girls' common room
- 6. Upgradation of sports facilities
- 7. Development of cycle and bike parking lot
- 8. Construction of ramp facilities for disabled students

6.3. Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1. What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The Institution relentlessly makes efforts to enhance the professional development of its faculty members. They are encouraged to participate in various seminars, workshops, conferences, and symposiums. Some of the faculty members have brought accolades to the institution through their papers presented at the national and international levels.

Moreover, the institution stages various curriculum-related interactive sessions to keep the teaching faculty up-dated. To enhance the teaching acumen among the faculty members, provisions for smart board, computer know-how, the techniques to be applied in language-laboratory and such other allied training programmes are arranged by the authority from time to time.

The college library is the store house of various reference books and current national and international journals which are easily accessible to the teachers, who also have the scope of browsing the internet for information on relevant topics.

Besides, the faculty members pursue career-oriented programmes in the form of Orientation and Refresher Courses, short- term courses and various other training programmes.

The institution also extends its support to the non-teaching staff so as to enhance their professional expertise. Computer training programmes and office-documentation workshops are attended by the non-teaching members including the library staff.

Moreover, the library has been going through the process of technical upgradation in the form of digitalization. The non-teaching staffs also attend professional training courses at the Academic Staff College. Besides, the non-teaching staffs of the college have been provided computer training programme, office documentation organised by the Computer

Science Department from time to time.

6.3.2. What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employers for the roles and responsibilities they perform.

The Institution manoeuvres effective strategies for motivating the employees on their roles and responsibilities through professional training programmes, sanctioning leave for the stipulated period and also by offering the platform to many profession- enhancement programmes, seminars and workshops. Proposal of teachers for foreign tour is also forwarded promptly to the superior authority.

6.3.3. Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for belter appraisal.

Each and every department keeps Annual Self-Appraisal Records of its faculty members and these are forwarded to IQAC for evaluation and consideration for better appraisal. The IQAC keeps a vigilant eye on the performances ratings of the Assistant Professors at their promotional level and subsequently the aspirants are both informed and encouraged for their further intellectual development.

6.3.4. What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stake-holders?

On the basis of the evaluation of multiple activities performed by faculty members, the IQAC maintains Academic Performance Indicator (API) which is mandatory for promotion as per the Government Directives which has been operationalised from the 13th November, 2013. Subsequently, the API is forwarded to the authority concerned through the Principal of the college. Those who are found not in tune with the expected level of performance are made aware of it so as to make him/her bring up to the mark.

6.3.5. What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff has the benefit of such schemes in the last 4 years?

The Institution has a Mutual Fund which provides easy loans at subsidised interest to both the teaching and the non-teaching staff. Besides this, the non-teaching staffs are given the opportunity in free training courses in computer education.

The Institution has also welfare schemes like GIS (Group Insurance Scheme) and GPF (Gross Provident Fund) which ensure the financial security of the families of the teaching and the non-teaching staff. The employees looking for Bank's loan against their salary are encouraged and served with prompt clearance from the office of the Principal. Against the reimbursement and guarantee from the Principal, as many as eleven teachers and two employees have availed H.B loan, Car loan, etc., so far. A Faculty Development Fund is also there in the college to cater to the various needs of its academic as well as co-curricular activities.

It is a matter of great pride that S.B.M.S College has disbursed salaries to all faculty members and the non-teaching staff of the Science Stream and the Computer Science Department for the last 25 years and 10 years respectively.

More than 50% of the College Staff has been benefitted from such schemes in the last four years.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The Institution feels pride to have eminent faculty members who have brought laurels not only to the institution but to the state also. The present Principal of our college, Dr. Dipesh Ch. Bhagabati, is a registered research-guide of Gauhati University. He has been invited as a resource person in various seminars and workshops.

Prof. Dimbeswar Saikia, the Vice-Principal of the college, popularly known as "Anubhab Tulasi", is a widely acclaimed poet. His collections of poetry have been acclaimed in international level. He has been invited to participate in various international Poetry Meets and received Excellence Award for his poetry. Another faculty member, Dr. Chittaranjan Das, is a renowned Assamese poet and is also the General Secretary, Assam Kobi Samaj. Besides, there are other faculty members whose academic contributions have further

enhanced the reputation of the institution. Dr. Jogesh Deka, is an expert in the field of Pancayati Raj System of Government. He has delivered more than five hundred (500) lectures on Panchayati Raj System in various Gaon-Panchayats in the entire state under the supervision of State Institute of Rural Development (SIRD), Govt. of Assam. Another faculty, Nihar Ranjan Kalita, has established himself through his participation in workshops, seminars in international level. S.B.M.S. College fraternity acknowledges their achievements by felicitating them. Dr. Prabin Ch. Baishya, retied Principal of our college is an eminent economist of the country as well as a registered guide of Gauhati University. His various research papers have been well acclaimed by academic community. Dr. Rajani Kanta Das, former Principal of our college has established himself by his intellectuality through various progressive writings and active involvement in reformist activities.

Eminent faculties are supported with all possible help for their further exposure. The institution too never fails to receive the enrichment from such personalities even after retirement. Occasionally they are invited to deliver lectures etc.

6.4. Financial Management and Resource Mobilisation

6.4.1. What is the Institutional Mechanism to effective monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The mechanism to ensure the effective and efficient use of financial resources mostly depends upon the source of the fund received. Because, whenever a fund is received from external agency, the guidelines for utilization are generally laid down by the funding agency. Accordingly, the project is implemented within framework of laid down guidelines. In the event of utilization of funds generated out of internal resources, Governing Body of the College is right from the project identification, implementation and completion, all along plays the lead role. Some auxiliary committees like construction committee, purchasing committee etc. are formed and at every stage of implementation the respective committees do play their role assigned to them. The supervision by the technical expert as per requirement is done. On the whole, it is the Governing Body of the College to play the role of immediate authority over the Principal & Secretary who is involved in the capacity of DDO in utilization of funds.

6.4.2. What are the Institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The receipt and expenditure of fund in the institution is executed under the direct supervision of the DDO, i.e. the Principal & Secretary of the college. Being a provincialized college with regulation 2(f) and 12 (B), the college receives grants from various Govt. Depts. and agencies. Accordingly, our income and expenditure is subject of verification by the Govt. Auditors. However, the Govt. auditors are, generally not available to the institution in its own demand. Rather, they approach the institutions for audit as per their schedule of agenda.

Under the prevailing situation, the DDO usually approaches the GB as his immediate authority on completion of a financial year. It is the GB who advises the Principal & Secretary to get accounts audited either by locally appointed Internal Auditor or by CA firm so as to get the financial status of the institution may be perceived within a relatively shorter period. It needs mention that even after doing that, the accounts remains a subject of audit by the auditor deputed by the Govt.

The last audit on financial accounts has been done in October, 2014. It reveals that audit on financial matter in the institution is kept up-to-date. The major audit suggestions are highlighted below:


- 1. Emphasis should be given on the proper maintenance of Cash Book with adequate narration and daily balancing of it. If so required, the Accountant should be given necessary training. Ledger Book and a Journal Book for bills received also need to be maintained.
 - Alternatively, Tally package may also be installed at the College Computer for doing the Accounts.
- 2. Fund-wise Receipt and Payment Account/ Income and Expenditure Account should be maintained for the college so that exact fund position for all the Accounts can be easily ascertained at any time. If required, the same should be resorted to on a

monthly basis.

- 3. Monthly Bank Reconciliation Statements should be prepared for all the Bank Accounts of the College.
- 4. Collections for the College should be remitted for deposit into Bank Account only after the same is being verified and accounted for in the Cash Bok by the Accountant of the College. Moreover, the collations for a day should be banked on immediate next banking day so that the risk of carrying cash balance can be minimised. Alternatively, the College may make an arrangement for direct deposit of College fees in to its Bank Account as is done by most of the colleges/ educational institutions these days.
- 5. Practice of issuing cheques in the name of bearer of the College should be stopped immediately. Rather, a system of issuing cheque to actual 'Payee' needs to be followed.
- 6. Funds diversion needs to be restrained as far as possible. If at all it is required, the same should be resorted to only after proper approval in the GB meeting.
- 7. Making of payments against 'Kachcha/Loose/Unprinted' format of vouchers should be discouraged as far as possible.
- 8. Payments/expenses in 'CASH' or 'BEARER' cheque should be restricted to less than Rs. 2000/-per case per day.
- 9. VAT and Income Tax should be deposited at source by the College on all applicable cases with immediate effect. For that, necessary VAT and TDS account number should be applied for.
- 6.4.3. What are the major sources of institutional receipts/ funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the resource fund / corpus available with institution, if any
- The sources of receipts and funding for the institution may be brought under two broad

categories, which may further be subcategorized as in the following flowchart.

Sources of Account



In budgeting the expenditure (in the event of both recurring and non-recurring heads), maximum care is taken in sustainability of the agenda. Care also is taken so that expenditure does not go beyond the limit of fund available in the purpose concerned. However, in spite of all efforts, if it cannot be limited to fund available, transfer of funds from one account to another one is done only with the approval of the G.B.

6.4.4. Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

A master plan for the college was prepared by an appointed Architect Engineer in 2012. The plan demands a cost of Rs. 9.85 crores for its implement at the contemporary rates of cost. We have approached different authorities like DHE, Assam, Ministry of DoNER, Govt. of India looking for release of fund for meeting the demands of this premier institution of higher education with more than 50 years old. Unfortunately, so far, no positive response is received from either of the authorities.

The DHE, Govt. of Assam has released an amount of Rs. 99.50 lacs in the year 2013 for infrastructure development. In addition to that, we have got some other grants from Govt. of Assam and UGC under different schemes. The amount received from different agencies (for other than salary purpose) during the period of last four years and their status of utilization is presented below in Table No. 6.10.

6.5. Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAC)

6.5.1. Has the institution established an IQAC cell? If yes, what is the institution policy with regards to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

The Institution has established an IQAC cell in the year 2005 and since then the cell has been operating with a view to maintain quality in all the different fields of the institutional activities. Record and documentation of all the activities of the college are kept by the IQAC systematically. The IQAC of the college also keeps a record of the proceedings, minutes and undertakings of all the different committee meetings.

6.5.2. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The academic and administrative decisions that have been taken by the IQAC till date have all been approved by the management/authorities for implementation.

6.5.3. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contributions made by them.

Yes, the IQAC has five external members on its committee. They are as follows:

They contribute whole-heartedly in the infrastructural related activities of the institution like the construction of new class rooms, toilets, boundary wall, common rooms for both boys and girls as well as in the renovation of old structures. Besides these, they also provide their valuable suggestions in the different academic functions held in the institution. For instance, they duly attend all the seminars, workshops, guardians meet and the different festivals held in the college.

6.5.4. Does the Institution have an integrated framework for Quality Assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If yes, give details on its operationalisation.

- The Institution has a systematic and integrated framework for Quality Assurance of the academic as well as administrative activities. The excellence in performance of the institution is the outcome of integrated effort for improvement in academic and administrative front. The Principal all the time tries to simultaneous improvement in both the front. In this regard, the following facts are worth-mentioning:
 - ❖ The G.B is the superior level policy measuring authority at the institution level which consists well representation from academic (Faculty) experts and members from administration branch.
 - ❖ The strategy for academic advancement is always discussed with the staff council which is convened by the Principal. After open deliberation, the matter is placed before the G.B for approval.
 - ❖ Administrative issues are discussed with the personnel of administrative branch and decisions are taken to make the office functioning student-friendly as much as

possible.

- ❖ To resolve the sensitive issues joint meetings of G.B, Staff Council members and non-teaching employees are also held.
- Our spirit of administration is guided by motivation for academic excellence. That is why more and more involvement of faculties in decision making process is initiated.

As far as the integrated co-ordination of both academic and administrative activities are concerned, at the foremost, the entire admission process is well formulated. The process is carried out with the cooperation of both the teaching and non-teaching staff of the Institution. Prior to the academic session, the authority along with the teaching faculty formulates the lay-out of the admission process. In order to disseminate qualitative academic atmosphere, 'Counselling Sessions' are organised prior to the admission process, thereby enabling the students to choose their subject-combinations as offered in the College Prospectus.

Every Department prepares their Academic Audits which serve as a measuring yard for recording the teaching-learning process which is evaluated by the authority. All the evaluations are thereafter forwarded to the IQAC for a final assessment.

In all the processes related to examinations, the administrative staff extends its full cooperation for their smooth conduct. For any issue that can be considered vital, the Governing Body maintains a close coordination with the IQAC.

6.5.5. How do student and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

The alumni, who now are mostly parents of the present students, provide their valuable suggestion for the uplift of the over-all academic atmosphere of the only institute of higher education of the locality.

Alumni-meets are held from time to time for the dissipation of their suggestions which are then forwarded to the IQAC through the authority. Donation of books to the college library is also a noteworthy contribution of the alumni.

Plantation-drives are held for enriching the environment of the institution with the joint effort of the Alumni and college fraternity. For the material upliftment of the institution, views and suggestions from the alumni are honoured.

The students are encouraged to freely express their views and opinions through feedback mechanism. Their problems and grievances are dealt with by the Grievance-Redressal Cell. Regarding the pursuit of their career, suggestions are forwarded by the Career Guidance Cell. The entire process is monitored by the IQAC to ensure quality enhancement.

The students' representative body (Students' Union) work as a mouth piece to ventilate the issues and engagements of the students to the IQAC through the teachers-in-charge. Besides, the General Secretary of the Student's Union is also a nominated member of the IQAC.

6.5.6. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC works as a monitor and mediator to facilitate the co-ordinated output from different constituents of the institution. Tabulated and systematic information and data regarding student-enrolment, collection of fees, results, special achievements of the teacher and the students, disbursement of scholarships, appointments, records of courses undertaken by the teaching and the non-teaching staff are collected and documented by the IQAC.

The IQAC intermittently holds meetings with the teachers' unit to discuss matters related to day-to-day deliberations as well as quality enhancement programmes. The IQAC takes note of the functioning of the library administration also. The detailed information from the library is annually submitted to the IQAC for further action-plan.

The General Secretary of the Students' Union, being a nominated member of the IQAC, transacts with the co-ordinator and other members of the IQAC.

Besides, the Grievance Redressal Cell and the Career Guidance Cell further promote the interests of the students through the IQAC. The IQAC along with the canteen committee monitors hygienic catering of the canteen. Blue collared workers are also supervised by the IQAC.

6.5.7. Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the quality assurance procedures? If yes, give details enumerating its impact.

The Institution organises various training programmes for both teaching and non-teaching staff. Various programmes on computer application and know-how, use of smart board, effective class room delivery through power-point presentation, office-documentation and programme on library digitalization help in implementing quality assurance procedures.

The various programmes enumerated above have been an ardent effort by the institution for the efficacious implementation of quality assurance procedures. A few of the classes are conducted through the smart board. The departmental information regarding syllabus, class and unit distribution, students' progress-reports, etc., are computerised. Some of the faculty members present power point lesson delivery. Information relating to academic and administrative matters are documented at the office. The process of the digitalization of the library is going on.

6.5.8. Does the institution undertake academic audit or other external reviews of the academic provisions? If yes, how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

There is an internal mechanism for academic audit which is functional at all departmental levels. The audit is carried out at phases pertaining to class records, unit distribution of the course contents, a comparative result analysis and students' regularity records and teaching plan. To strive at excellence, the institution operates a feedback mechanism among students having Major and teachers to include informal departmental meetings wherein the future course of action is decided upon.

The institution provides a platform for external review of the academic provisions. Parents have easy access to the authority as well as the teaching faculty for discussing vital issues relating to their wards. Alumni and other stake-holders of the institution extend their valuable suggestions for improvement of institutional activities. Distinguished Resource-

Persons deliver lectures on various topics decided by the institution from time to time. The feedback left behind by them work as a catalyst to further improve the institutional activities. The institution is open to and subject of inspection by the authorities like, Department of Higher Education, Assam, Office of the Registrar, Gauhati University, representative(s) of U.G.C, etc. Such inspections are carried out time to time with specific agenda, on report of which future course of action depends.

6.5.9. How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/ regulatory authorities?

As per the directives of the external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities, the internal quality assurance mechanisms are implemented. The regular updates, regarding the website uploads, circulars and notifications are communicated to the faculty through the authority and the IQAC. As it is mandatory, there is continuous transaction between the Office of the Directorate of Public Instruction and the Institution regarding its functioning, appointment and promotion, and implementation of new directives. The various grants from the UGC and the State Government are brought for utilisation by the Institution through correspondence which is then liquidated under different heads. The academic activities of the Institution are corroborated by the affiliating university. The immediate matters and those demanding urgent deliberation are dealt with through the Governing Body of the institution. So far as the disbursement of scholarships is concerned, the institution not only maintains link with the State Government, but also with other funding agencies such as Char Area Development Scholarship, Minorities Scholarship, Ajmal Foundation, etc.

6.5.10. What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teachinglearning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcomes.

The institution strictly adheres to the Academic Calendar which specifies the working days, holidays, examination schedule, co-curricular activities, Students' Union Body election and other academic activities. On the basis of the daily class-routine, the teaching-learning process is regulated. At the onset of every academic session, a teaching plan is prepared by every department which specifies the unit distribution of the course contents.

The institution maintains a mechanism of Academic Audit wherein records of class deliberation, course completion, student progression report and feedback are kept updated. On the whole, the entire evaluation process is monitored by the authority.

Moreover, the institution also encourages the teaching faculty to attend career- oriented programmes, workshops and seminars to enrich the teaching-learning process. There is a provision in the daily class routine for tutorial and remedial classes to cater to the need of extra guidance to the students.

The entire mechanism enforces timely completion of course content, enhances teacherstudent rapport, smooth conduct of classes and disciplined academic environment, thereby ensuring active involvement of students and teachers in the teaching-learning process.

6.5.11. How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanism and outcomes to the various internal and external stake-holders?

The Institution communicates its quality assurance policies, mechanism and outcomes to the various internal and external stake-holders in many different ways. It frequently conducts parents-teachers meet, alumni meet, Governing Body meeting, and meeting of the Staff council, meeting with the Academic Committee and also through the Annual Report prepared by the college.

Besides, the institution also uploads the results of various examinations conducted by the parent university (Gauhati University) on a regular basis through its website:

The authority also makes a close contact with the media personnel and all important events and milestone achievements do reach the people through the media.

CRITERION-VII

INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the college conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

SBMS College is located in Sualkuchi, a small village on the bank of the mighty river Brahmaputra. The land of this rural area is therefore rich and fertile having a huge variety of fauna. This adds both to the picturesque quality and the naturalness of a large area around the institution.

Environmental consciousness is enshrined in the main objective of the institution and plantation of tree is the major concern carried out by the authority to maintain an eco-friendly atmosphere inside the campus.

'Green Audit' of the campus is carried out and maintained especially by the department of Botany, which is also supervising the maintenance of the existing trees and planting new trees. The NSS and the NCC units plant herbs and trees and this is their joint venture to celebrate World Environmental Day in the campus. This is a non-academic pursuit that develops eco-friendly concern among the students. The Green Audit reveals the facts in the following Table No 7.1.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

In order to maintain eco-friendly atmosphere in the campus the following measures are adopted:

(i) Energy Conservation:

• There is a frequent electricity scarcity in the greater Sualkuchi area. Therefore the minimum consumption of energy is the saving factor of energy conservation in the campus.

- The cross ventilated system with big windows in all the classrooms minimize the usage of energy.
- The use of CFL bulbs instead of tungsten lamps, conducting open air functions also reduce energy consumption.
- Signboards and slogans are put inside the campus to bring awareness among the students about the importance of energy consumptions.
- Lights and fans are switched off while not in use.
- Collaborative and team work in the same place reduce energy consumption.

(ii) Use of Renewable Energy:

At present the institution has no provision for production and use of renewable energy. There is a frequent power shortage in the college for which the authority wants to go for solar energy which will cut down power bills. The authority also submitted a proposal to UGC for a solar power plant. Necessary steps have been taken by the institution for minimum usage of electricity and minimize the electric bills.

(iii) Rain Water-Harvesting:

The system is yet to be introduced. Water level rises in the low level areas of the college campus during rainy season. The rain water is channelized towards bore wells to raise the ground water level which is then used to serve the various purposes of the college. There is a pond inside the campus, remain full with rain water and ground water which also serves the needs of the college.

(iv) Hazardous Waste Management:

There are no hazardous chemicals used in the college laboratory. The minimum wastage is drained after taking necessary treatment so as to make it non-hazardous. The institution is declared 'Plastic Free Zone' which has brought down the usage of plastic goods and other chemicals to the minimum. The NSS unit of the institution organized seminars and different health-camps to bring awareness among the students as well as in the entire community.

(v) E-Waste Management:

There is no major e-waste generated. Most of the waste products are disposed through auction to competent agencies who handle such waste and the process is conducted once in a year. Non-Working computers, printers, monitors and other such items are discarded on systematic procedures. The environmental projects carried out by the students motivated them to make the campus eco-friendly. The NSS unit with its efforts organized seminars and workshop on environmental issues every year to bring awareness on environmental protection among the students and the people of the entire community.

(vi) Efforts for Carbon Neutrality:

The institution is situated in the north bank of the river Brahmaputra surrounded in a lush green environment.

The gardens with variety of flowers inside the campus look beautiful and make the campus eco-friendly.

Though vehicles are permitted inside the campus, there is a limitation of excess entries and exits of the same so as to keep the campus noise and pollution free. The way to the campus bifurcates from the main road for which not many vehicles use the road leading to the main entrance to the college. The entire campus is pollution free for which it is felt that carbon neutrality is present in the campus.

(viii) Plantation:

There are various kinds of trees in the college campus which help to maintain the ecosystem. Planting of trees by the chief guests of various functions envisages the ecoconsciousness inherent in the college practices. This is also a regular feature of the NSS, NCC and Social Service special camps.

Moreover the college has taken initiatives to maintain eco-friendliness in the campus as the following:

- a) Maintaining cleanliness
- b) Waste disposal system
- c) Hygienic Sanitation
- d) Natural Drainage friendly landscape

7.2. Innovations:

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Following are the innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college:

(i) Academic Innovation:

The College has introduced a new mechanism of Academic innovation in the form of Audit report. It includes -

- Quality of the teaching learning progression of each individual teacher.
- Transparency in the student's progression report in the examination. At the time of declaration of results of Internal Examination, students are given their answerscripts for a self-evaluation.
- Daily class records of the individual teacher.

There are other academic innovations which include:

- Formulation of the Question Bank with probable questionnaires for under-Graduate classes
- ICT/ Smart Board Class room facilities in some of the rooms
 Moreover, remedial and tutorial classes have been started and offered to students who need special attention.

(ii) Feedback system:

Student's feedback on teachers and about the courses is a regular mechanism for the under-graduate classes. This helps in improvement in teaching and curriculum designing.

The process is discussed and reviewed between the teachers and the authority where corrective measures are taken. The students can also give their feedback through their representatives or in the suggestion box.

(iii) Online Information Sources:

This service is provided to the students through college website where the students can receive all kinds of information about the activities of the college. Moreover the authority also sends message to student with mobile network, in case of emergency.

(iv) Quality in teaching, learning and evaluation process:

To improve the quality of education and evaluation all the faculties of the college are encouraged to attend different seminars, conferences, workshops, refresher and orientation courses, short- term courses held in different institutions and universities, so as to inculcate the best practices in education and for their self- development. The college also organizes various programmes on skill development for both students and teachers.

(v) Community work with social reasonability:

The institution always tries to motivate students by organizing different activities so that they can become responsible to the society.

Every year the NSS, the NCC and the Social Service wing of the college organize collaborative programme with the students and the local people. The seminar on environmental issues, popular talk on HIV/AIDS, Blood donation camp, community work with a village adoption camp etc. brought the students and the local people in one platform. This encouraged the students to make a close relationship with the society as a whole.

The Women Cell of the college also deals with various community works such as weavers' enlightenment programme, programme on gender issues, seminar on witch-hunting, workshop on women empowerment etc., which encouraged the female members of the society to become self-dependent. Thus the institution undertakes social works along with academic activities.

(vi) The perspective annual plan:

In the beginning of each academic year the authority, the management, the faculty members, other sub-committees and the IQAC formulate annual plan for academic and infrastructure development. Besides, the Principal of the college maintains a close contact with the various sub-committees to carry out the different activities relating to both academic and infrastructure development. The authority along with the IQAC gives an account of the outcome achieved by the end of the academic year. Moreover, the authority maintains parallel records of expenditure.

(vii) Innovation in library:

The Central library of the college is rich with books and journals, newspapers and other reference books. The authority is always concerned with the overall development of the library, and a huge amount is spent in purchasing departmental books and journals. The reading room facility, the internet zone and the installation of xerox machine are some of the innovations in the library where students have better opportunity to avail these facilities. The college is N-Listed recently which provides the scope to avail the resources free of cost.

There are also departmental libraries where students of each department are equally benefitted. Other innovations in the library are:

- a) The Network Resource Centre in the library
- b) Data entry process to maintain the record of a book

(viii) Introduction of extension education and vocational courses:

The college has introduced DCA, BCA and also PGDCA courses keeping in view the need of exposure of computer education in job market now-a-days. The Department

of Computer science has trained the students about the technical know-how of the different computer courses.

There is a study centre of K.K. Handiqui State Open University (KKHSOU) and also a centre of Institute of Distance and Open learning (IDOL) in the campus. These two study centres provide equal opportunity to a large number of students from Sualkuchi and its adjoining villages which help them to pursue both Higher Secondary and Undergraduate degrees.

(ix) Involving students in project work:

A few departments namely, Assamese, Education, Philosophy, English encourage the students to involve with project work in relevant topics according to the curriculum designed by the parent university. Students are also encouraged to engage themselves in environmental project work by arranging field trip to different places.

(x) Improvement of Infrastructure:

The institution thrives to improve the infrastructure facilities and constantly endeavors to raise the fund from multifarious sources. The following are some of the major infrastructure development projects carried out by the institution in the last four years.

- Renovation of the departmental rooms with sanitary facility
- Construction of the first floor of a multi- storied Buniyad Building
- Introduction of an internet zone
- Introduction of a language laboratory, smart classes
- Renovation and construction of five sets of toilet facilities for both girls' and boys' common rooms, and teachers' common room
- Construction of a canteen with running water facilities
- Installation of a 20 KV volts generator
- Renovation of the administrative building
- Phase-wise construction of the boundary wall along with the entrance gate
- Computerisation of Administrative Process

 Submission of a long-listed Plan Proposal for further infrastructural development of the college under 12th plan

7.3 Two best practices:

- To maintain the student's daily attendance records, including total percentage of attendance in the class by a student

Goal:

With the aim of creating a disciplined academic environment in the institution, the college is trying its level best under the umbrella of its authority. Among the various drives undertaken for this purpose, the introduction of a system of keeping Academic Audit is a unique one.

The Context:

The Academic Audit Report is based on three phases:

a) The First phase maintains the records of entire class records of the individual

teacher, the total class records, reasons for not taking classes, reasons for

cancellation of classes and the list of holidays.

b) The Second phase contains the unit distribution of a paper among the faculties of

each department which also includes the entire unit distribution, teaching plan,

and the completion of a chapter of a particular paper.

c) The Third phase focuses on the comparison of student progression record in both

internal and external examination.

The Practice:

The system of maintaining Academic Audit has been contributing a lot to the systematic

and smooth conduct of academic activities of the institution. The teaching-learning process has

been enriched and thereby student's academic performance has been developing. The particular

mechanism is a systematic force for positively motivating both the teachers and the students, to

involve themselves whole heartedly for the academic pursuit of the institution.

The Principal of the College monitors the details of this Academic Audit and consults with

the Head of the department in the academic meeting and carries out the necessary actions for

further improvement.

Best practice – 2

(ii) Student Welfare Fund

Objective of the Practice:

The institution maintains a student welfare fund. The basic objective of this fund is to help and motivate the economically poor but meritorious students to receive education.

Goal:

There are many talented students in our society who have the desire to receive higher education but due to financial crisis their wishes and desires remain dormant and do not come into reality. This is nothing but the wastage of human resources. That higher education has become a costly commodity affordable by only the creamy layer of the society is the harsh reality. On the realization of this situation, the institution tries on its level best to compensate the situation by providing certain assistance to the poor students who have the real urge for higher education.

The practice:

The institution, being the only institution of higher education of the locality, feels the responsibility of educating the poor students with its limitations.

Every year during the Student Admission Process an amount of rupees twenty (20/-) is collected from students in the name of Student Welfare Fund. The teacher-in-charge of this fund takes the responsibility of this fund as the coordinator.

The student who is economically poor can apply for assistance from this fund and on verification; the particular student is supported by the fund in the form of issuing of books and releasing the particular students from paying tuition fees at least for four (4) months. Every year thus, the fund is helping the needy students.
